Newbury to Discuss New Vehicle Law In Radio Address

Secretary of State Newbury will address the people of Oregon by radio Sunday on the subject of the state's new Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility law, which becomes effective August 2.

Secretary Newbury will speak from Salem on July 1 on a statewide broadcast. It is hoped that this will make it possible for everyone in the state to hear the address, which will be the first of two major radio talks Mr. Newbury will deliver between now and August 2, as administrator of the new law.

Both addresses are part of a broad public educational program the state is conducting through the Secretary of State's office to inform the people accurately and adequately about the benefits, requirements and penalties of the Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility law before it becomes effective. Inform the people accurately and return Newbury will explain the difference between the present Financial Responsibility law, which ceases to operate on August 2, and the Safety Responsibility law, which takes its place.

He will then give a brief explanation of the reasons for enacting the much stricter new law, how motorists can protect themselves against prompt suspension of their motoring privileges following an accident, and what happens if they fail to pay for the damages they caused.

Accidents Claim 2 In Douglas County

Two Douglas County accidents claimed the lives of two men, Friday and Saturday.

Lee Reimer, Bandon, was killed when the automobile in which he was riding went out of control on a turn, and plunged over an embankment on Highway 42, ten miles from Roseburg, Saturday. His chest was crushed.

Floyd Harrington, 53, was working as flagman for the Carl M. Halvorson Construction Co., when he was run over by a large dirt mover.

The accident occurred Friday on the new highway construction work south of Canyonville.

Oregon Tech Two Earn Honor Grades

Two Cottage Grove students who attend Oregon Technical Institute at Klamath Falls, have been placed on the spring term honor roll, according to word received from the institute's director.

Charles (Wilbur) Heath received a grade point of 3.5 in diesel mechanics, and Ellen Madson (Mrs. Berwyn Mattoon) received a straight A grade point in medical technology.

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Fish Hatcheries Get Trout Eggs

Game commission fish hatcheries have completed their annual take of wild rainbow eggs at East lake near Bend. The 870,000 eggs obtained will be sent to several state hatcheries.

Large seining nets are employed to trap East lake rainbow as they move into shoal areas.

Until the larger rainbow move out, a line of marker buoys designates spawning areas where sport fishing is banned. The marker buoys will be pulled July 1, and other lines will be established September 1, when brook trout move inshore to spawn.

East lake provides most of the eastern brook eggs needed for stocking in Oregon.

A third wild trout egg-take was conducted on Spencer creek south of Klamath Falls. Some Spencer creek eggs were lost when a flash flood took out the dam and water supply for the egg-holding troughs.

Egg-taking operations at Diamond lake began May 11, and have provided another 1,230,000 rainbow eggs.

Another 1,500,000 spring rainbow eggs were stripped from brood fish held at the McKenzie hatchery.

Most rainbow reared at Oregon's 14 game fish hatcheries are obtained from fall spawning stock selected at the hatcheries. These brood fish are used for six years and then released.

Salmon Receive Aid

A joint fish commission-game commission crew is completing a fishway this summer around Valseltz falls on the Siletz river below Valseltz, according to a Game Commission report.

This 41 foot waterfall forms a natural barrier for steelhead and salmon migrations in the upper Siletz river.

Excavation work undertaken in a rock formation last summer was slow and the project was terminated by high water. The completed fish ladder will open many miles of spawning ground above the falls.

When drilling and blasting is completed a permanent concrete fish ladder will be poured in bedrock.

The ladder pools will be eight feet wide and 12 feet long, providing easy jumps for the fish. Total length will be 329 feet.

Cost of the Valseltz fish ladder, to be shared equally by the two departments, is estimated at \$30,000.

New Pool For Fish

Oregon State Game Commission bulletin has reported an innovation in Oregon salmon culture. It is the special holding pond for mature spring chinook salmon to be built for use this summer at the Game Commission hatchery on Butte Creek, tributary of the Rogue River.

Previously, holding adult spring chinooks in artificial ponds has not been particularly successful.

Considerable losses have been incurred also when salmon were stopped at the racks on their upstream migration in June and held until spawning time in September.

Instead of being stopped at the rack, fifty salmon will be diverted into the new pond and the rest of the run allowed to proceed upstream.

ANTELOPE TO GET MORE WATER HOLES

A cooperative agreement for construction of two new antelope waterholes in Lake county was recently signed by the Game Commission, Bureau of Land Management and the Grazing District Advisory Board.

The holes will be located in the area west of St. Patrick mountain in northern Lake county, and will cover an area 90 by 175 feet, according to the Oregon State Game Commission bulletin.

Eight holes have been constructed previously.
