Oregon Scenery Is Film Subject

Oregon's coast scenery is being filmed this week by Vincent H. Hunter, head of Union Pacific Railroad's motion picture bureau, who is preparing a 16 millimeter production in color and sound, which will be given nationwide distribution next year.

Hunter, accompanied by Jack Patterson, an ace Hollywood photographer, was in the Astoria area, and will work southward to the Coos Bay area, visiting beaches enroute.

The motion picture will probably be named "Northwest Empire," and will be a cross section of life in Oregon and Washington, including agricultural and industrial scenes as well as highlighting the enjoyment of the Pacific Northwest as a vacation land.

It will have background music composed especially for it. "Northwest Empire" is to be the first in a series of 30-minute motion pictures of regions of the west served by Union Pacific lines, Hunter said.

The railroad expects it to reach an audience of several million people through showings before clubs, schools, and groups of all kinds.
