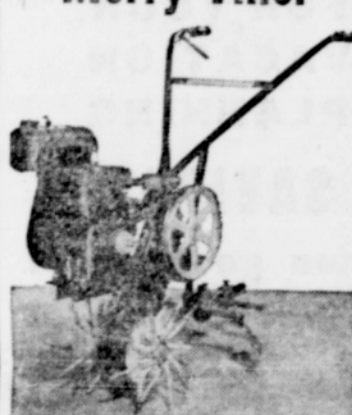
William Purcell was re-elected for a three-year term on the school board at the annual school meeting held recently.

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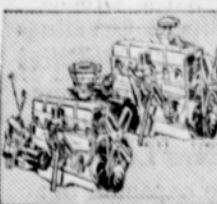
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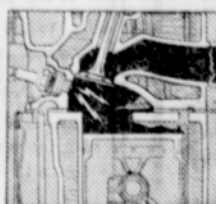
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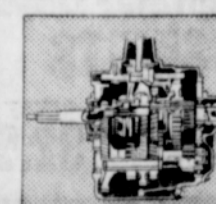
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
