Women, Children Need Education

Hunting and fishing are getting worse all the time—less sportsmanship, more poaching, and more violations. The only way to lick the problem is to educate the kids, and to sell their mothers on the importance of conservation education.

In his article in the July issue of Sports Afield, Jack Connor takes us on a trip he made with Minnesota game warden, Ben Cohen. The warden, deeply troubled by increasing pressure on our fish and game, pointed out that his love of nature was taught to him by his mother and father. His father, a cattle-and-fur buyer, knew that without conservation, his source of income would be wiped out. Ben's mother too knew of conservation's importance to the family, and so instilled in him the important fact that it is criminal to waste or misuse any of our natural resources. That's how Ben got his primary education in conservation and sportsmanship.

"Educate the kids," says Ben, "and you've got the problem licked. Educate their mothers too, because they're the ones with the greatest influence on kids. Women and children first. That's the education job we've got to do—in war and in peace."

It was the biggest salmon total in any June since the engineers began counting.

The run still continues; 2078 passed the dam Saturday, the last day of the month.

The blueback run continues strong after reaching a record high last week. June total passing upstream was 81,069.
