

1951 Forest Fires To Date Exceed Last Year's Total

Many Oregon citizens will find it hard to believe that more forest land was burned over in the state of Oregon up to May 15, 1951, than during the whole season of 1950. Since there were very few lightning storms that set fires almost every fire was man-caused.

The carelessness exhibited by those having land clearing fires and operating power saws during periods of low humidity and east winds last April in some instances amounted to complete disregard for forest resources and for neighbors, according to the Keep Oregon Green Association.

The fact that these fires, like the Tillamook fire, in April started under the worst conditions for control experienced in many years merely aggravated the tragedy. It was necessary for Governor McKay to advance the closed fire season more than a month. Oregon's closed season is May 15; this year it was moved to April 10.

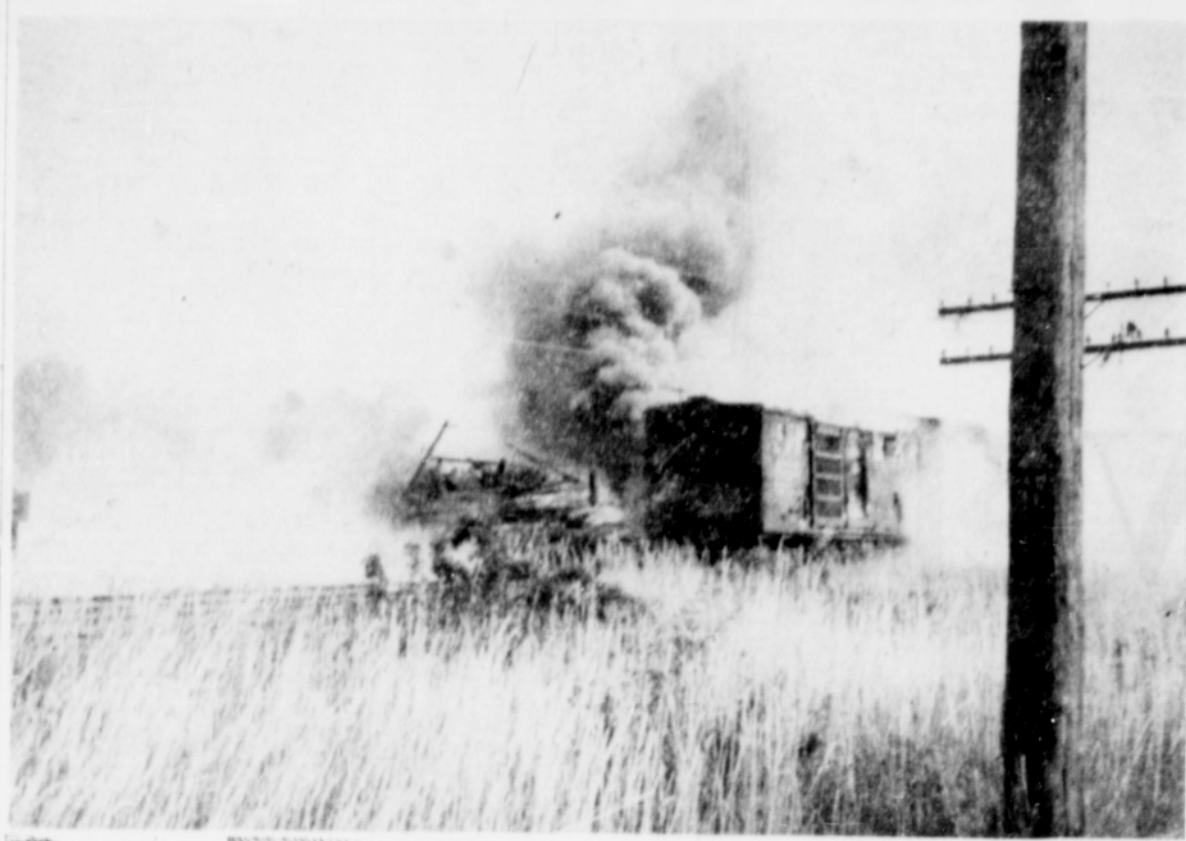

Red Cross Gives Advice to Swimmers

The Red Cross not only trains folks to swim, it is also interested in safeguarding people of all ages during the hot summer days when they are tempted to use the many swimming holes in Lane County.

With vacation ahead and a heap of good swimmin' holes awaiting you throughout the county, the Lane County Chapter of American Red Cross has released a list of "do's and don'ts" for swimmers to observe:

1. Select a safe place to swim, preferably one supervised by qualified lifesavers.
2. Don't try to demonstrate abilities you do not possess.
3. Don't go beyond your depth, either in the water or in a canoe or small boat, unless you can swim.
4. Don't stay in the water too long.
5. Make sure the water is deep enough and free of obstruction before attempting to dive.
6. Don't go in the water when overheated or tired.
7. Don't swim alone.
8. Wait about one hour after eating before going in the water.
9. Stay with the craft if upset in boat or canoe.
10. Learn how to save yourself and others from drowning and how to apply artificial respiration.
