Aerial Liberation For Fish to Start

The game commission's aerial fish liberation operation for inaccessible Cascade lakes will get under way next week with releases of trout in Deschutes national forest lakes.

Some 400 high Cascade lakes, reached only by trail, will be stocked with 1,200,000 eastern brook and 1,000,000 rainbow fingerling trout this month.

Rogue River national forest lakes will be flown from Klamath Agency, Deschutes and Willamette national forest lakes from Fall River fish hatchery air strip near Bend, and Mt. Hood national forest lakes from Hood River.

Fishery Agents Reino Koski and John Dimick will assist Sam Whitney, Newberg pilot, in bombarding the high lakes with fish. Drops are made at altitudes ranging from 100 to 300 feet and all flying must be done in the early morning to avoid turbulent mountain air currents.

Ten gallon milk cans are used to haul the trout from hatchery to air strip and compressed air is bubbled through the cans to keep the fish frisky. The trout are then transferred to a three-compartment belly tank on a Piper super cub for transport to their new home. A steep climb must be made for drops over small lakes of the fish would be showered across the timber. It is expected that 40 lakes a day will be hit with trout.

On Tuesday the first trial runs will be made to test carrying capacity of the new tank and the water aeration. As in past years fish survival checks will be made on different lakes. Anglers visiting back-country lakes are urged to report on the success of the aerial trout planting and conditions of the fish.

Timber Suggestion To Be Closed Soon
Only fifteen more days are left to get suggestions filed in the Eugene B.L.M. office listing tracts of O. & C. and Public Domain timber desired by prospective purchasers to be considered for inclusion in the 1952 calendar year sales program, we were informed by District Forester Otto Kreuger.
One-hundred million board feet is the maximum amount that can be offered and adequately taken care of in calendar year 1952, Kreuger said.
Forms for submitting suggestions to the local B.L.M. office can be obtained upon request at the district office in Room 211 of the Post Office Building, Eugene. Information about the type of timber that will be given preference, volume available by forest units, and other specific and general instructions to prospective bidders can also be obtained at the district headquarters in Eugene.
The final sales plan to be recommended for advertising in 1952 will be prepared after consultation with the district advisory board. It is pointed out by Mr. Kreuger that unless suggestions are received on or before August 1, 1951, they cannot be considered for inclusion in the sales plan.
A board meeting of the Eugene District Advisory Board to consider the sales plan prepared from the suggestions made by interested bidders is tentatively set for late in September.

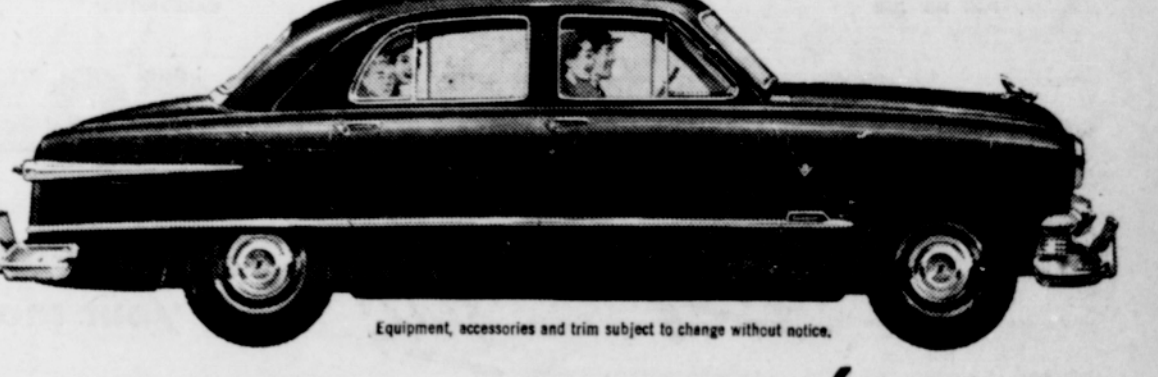
