

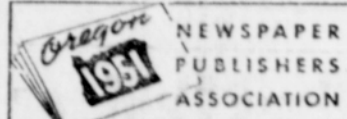
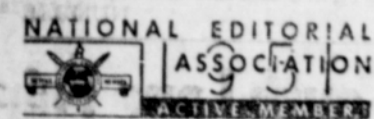

GETTING A NAME

A situation not appreciated by the average resident is the fact that this community seems to be getting rather an unsavory name as result of shootings, rape cases and a lot of lesser incidents which have caused young people to run afoul of the law. The thing that impelled the city council to pass an ordinance prohibiting the leaving of children unattended on the streets seems to point a strong finger of suspicion at negligent parents, which many suspect are the real root of the present trouble.

There isn't any cure from trouble of this sort outside of a moral reawakening, which many have refused to admit they need. A good deal of the present difficulties can be laid to the excessive use of liquor and it does not appear that those who are advocating the use of moderation in the consumption of liquor are getting anywhere.

Drinking is a problem which has plagued the world from the beginning of time. The trouble with most people is they think the right to take a drink is one of the four freedoms. Some can stop, others can't, but it's the guy who can't stop that often gives the most trouble when told he has to. He insists that it is his constitutional right to drink when and where he pleases. If he becomes an alcoholic thru the use of excessive drinking, he will either die a drunkard or reform and if you will take the trouble to investigate a good many alcoholics, you will find they insisted on the right to drink.

If alcoholism is a disease as leading medical authorities say it is, there is an increasing number of people being exposed to this disease at the present time. The only organization which offers to salvage the excessive drinker is Alcoholics Anonymous. But this organization can't do you any good unless you reach the point where you are willing to put your faith in a higher power, which means that you quit. This is one issue you don't ride the fence, either you quit drinking and straighten up or you can continue until you die.

WHO'S YOUR FAVORITE SENATOR?

Perhaps you noticed the recent favorite U. S. senator list submitted by a poll of 128 correspondents. The results of the poll also showed the worst senator as tabulated in the September issue of the National Magazine.

Selection of the worst and best senator does not mean a great deal and probably won't affect the thinking of the average voter, except the 128 correspondents who participated in the poll are better qualified to make such selections since many have occasions to note the quality of work a senator does or can do. Sometimes too the worst senator can be the vote getter.

Paul Douglas, Illinois democrat, was named the best senator while Joseph McCarthy, Wisconsin republican, was named the worst. In this connection it is noted that McCarthy is scheduled to address a republican gathering in Portland soon and a good many are wondering if the speaker was selected before the best and worst list was published. State leaders were certainly aware that attempts had been made to have McCarthy ousted from the senate.

Second best on the senate list was Estes Kefauver, Tennessee democrat, followed by Sen. Wayne Morse, Oregon republican and Sen. Robert Taft, Ohio republican. In 1949 Taft was voted first best.

While it was not announced on what basis the worst senators were selected, in McCarthy's case, it is assumed that he fell into disfavor because of his mudslinging tactics. There is no doubt that McCarthy has done some good, but his efforts have also done the country much harm in the eyes of the outside world.

The efforts of the present senate session have been confined largely to investigations and hearings. Neither party can brag about the accomplishments of the 81st congress. Even recommendations for a more efficient government and the recommendations of the Hoover commission have been largely ignored.

CURB ON FEDERAL SPENDING

Some state papers have been commenting on the possibility of calling a constitutional convention in 1952 for the purpose of limiting the amount of money the federal government can collect. The AP says that 26 states have at various times voted resolutions urging limitation of federal tax collections. Thirty-two states must ratify a call for a constitutional convention before the session may be called, but relief from this source seems extremely remote.

The Roseburg News Review quotes figures from a United States committee investigating expenses of the executive department as related to states and municipalities. The committee found that in 1916, local governments collected 65 per cent of all taxes, while state governments collected 12 per cent and the federal government collected 23 per cent.

The federal government now collects 72 per cent of all government revenue, local governments collect 14 per cent and state governments collect 14 per cent. In less than 40 years the positions of the state and federal governments have been reversed.

The federal tax load has reached the point where it has caused taxpayers to rebel at additional local taxes. The reason for this is that most of the local tax levies are out in the open while the greater proportion of federal taxes are either hidden or so distant that they fail to arouse any opposition.

Flood Donations For Relief, Slow

Nearly \$1800 of Lane County's \$2800 quota for mid-west flood relief has been turned in to the Red Cross chapter in Eugene, but contributions from the county have been slow.

Ray Siegenthaler, Eugene, chairman of the special appeal, said that many letters have been received from the flood area painting a picture of loss and destruction.

"In case of disaster anywhere in

Lane County, we would look to others in the nation to help us," he declared. We can do no less than our share in helping the suffering thousands in the flood states." It is estimated that 22,000 families are asking Red Cross help in reestablishing themselves.

Residents of the Cottage Grove area may send checks or cash to the Red Cross, 43 Eighth Avenue, W., Eugene. Checks may be made out to American Red Cross—Mid-West Flood Relief.

STAMPS ON AUTO POLICIES

All car liability insurance policies must carry a stamp specifying whether each policy meets the requirements of Oregon's new financial responsibility act which went into effect August 2.

The new law also provides that every driver involved in an accident which results in death, injury or property damage of \$100 or over must file a report with the secretary of state within 24 hours, but is exempted from other provisions of the new act if he proves that at the time of the mishap he was carrying liability insurance with a company recognized in Oregon.

A driver faces suspension of both driver's license and owner's registrations if he has no liability coverage and cannot deposit cash or collateral within 60 days to cover damages. The provision is intended to protect the public from reckless and irresponsible drivers who are financially unable to pay for the damages they may cause.

TO VOTE ON FAG TAX

When sure-footed Representative Gust Anderson, Portland, makes a statement, you discount anything contradictory that you may hear. There have been so many claims and counter-claims secured on the number of signatures and truck law referendums that everybody is jumpy.

Recently Anderson said that more than the required 16,429 signatures have been secured. This will hold up the 3-cent per pack cigarette tax until the people of Oregon can vote on it at the next general election.

CAPITOL SHORTS

Governor McKay has named Stanley Earl, Portland, to be chairman of the new Oregon Relief for Korea and India organizations. . . . Oregon veterans of World War II borrowed \$29,918,539 from the state to purchase homes and farms in the six fiscal years that closed June 30. . . . On the average a hop grower can sell only 7 1/2 per cent of his 1951 crop. No oil rationing this winter.

President of the Senate Paul Patterson presided over the first meeting of the new state emergency board last week. All are members of the legislature who voted away their authority to allocate state funds. Now they are only an advisory body for the governor.

SWEDISH PAPERS POLITIC

"Every little city in Sweden has its own newspaper," said Rolf Edberg, editor in chief of a large newspaper in Gottenborg, Sweden, when he visited state officials at the capitol recently. Swedish papers keep in close touch with the business of the government and the cantons (states) and devote considerable space to politics. He was anxious to learn the pattern of legislative procedure in

Oregon, as he has been a member of the Swedish parliament for the past ten years.

When informed that Oregon had recently finished its longest legislative session, which just exceeded 100 days, he expressed surprise, and commented that the Swedish parliament meets every year on January 11 and stays in session until May 31, then often convenes again in the middle of September, and stays in session until one week before Christmas.

Edberg, one of six Swedish representatives of the Council of Europe, is in the United States to study American government, labor affairs and the public information industry.

"WAR IS NOT INEVITABLE"

"Our foreign policy would be entirely different today if we thought that war was inevitable," said Carlton Savage, Salem, who has spent the past 24 years with the United States state department in Washington, D. C. and is this week visiting relatives in the Willamette valley.

"The Kremlin is out for a world dominated by communism and all of our foreign policy is formulated with that in mind. As a central part of the policy we are building physical strength, hoping we shall never have to use it," Savage asserted.

"There is more emphasis on consultation with the military than ever before in forming policy," he added. "I deplore today's foreign policy scene as not a pretty picture, but there can be no clear cut policy that has all desirable features today; this is bad, that's bad, but you have got to choose one, and none are a very happy solution," he continued.

NO STATE PROPERTY TAX

For the 11th straight year there won't have to be a state property tax. The state tax commission made this statement in announcing their state tax levy; that \$87,693,539 will be needed in taxes for state purposes for the fiscal year which begins July 1. This is \$16,000,000 more than was used the past fiscal year.

MUST CALL FOR BIDS

All school districts are now required to call for bids on purchases of supplies and other materials. Heretofore only the first class districts in the state were required to ask for bids.

MORE EMERGENCY TEACHERS

There is still a shortage of certified teachers in Oregon and while all positions will be filled it will require the issuance of emergency permit certificates for the 1951-1952 school year.

About 2000 emergency certificates are contemplated. Required qualifications vary in different states and out-of-state teachers are given these certificates until they can become eligible for permanent certificates next year.

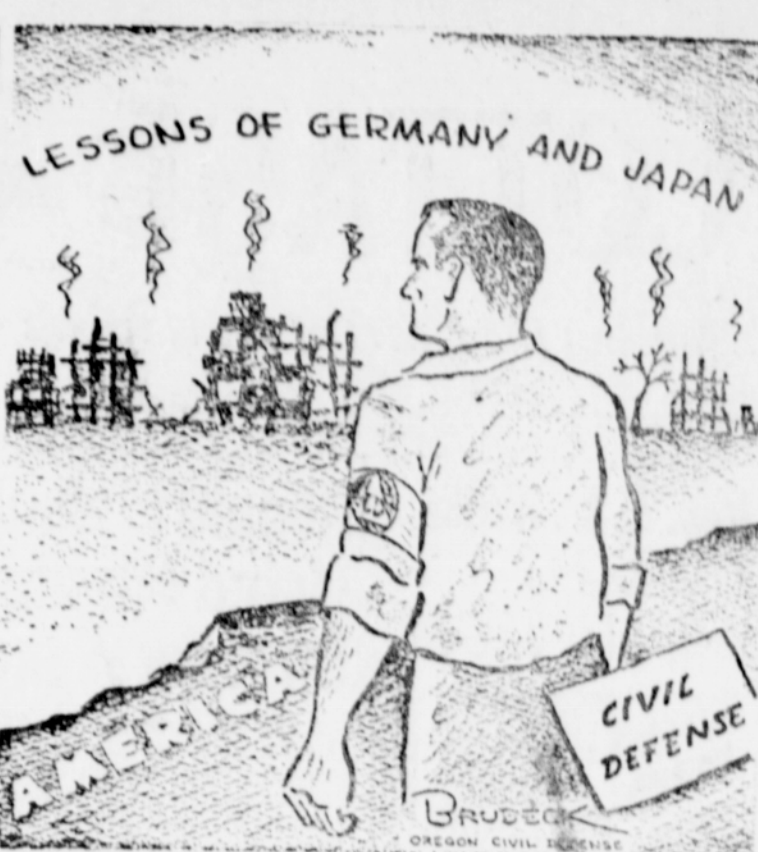
SMALL SCHOOL DISTRICTS HIT

One of the many laws passed by the 1951 legislature, which went into effect this month, is worrying small school districts of the state. This new law requires all public agencies to install a 40-hour week for employees. Many of these districts have been employing janitors and similar help on a 48-hour week basis. The districts have no extra money budgeted.

"This law has caused more inquiries," said Rex Putnam, superintendent of public instruction, "than any other school law passed by the recent legislature."
