Shrine Game to Use Set Defense System

That this year's Shriners' hospital football game will be a spectacular offensive thriller, almost a certainty because of the playing personnel, was assured this week when the committee voted to adopt a system of set defenses.

The action, concurred in by both coaching staffs, was taken after careful consideration of all possible angles and after it was highly recommended by many college coaches. Many all-star games throughout the country employ set defenses, although this will be the first time it will be used in Oregon.

Inside the 10 yard lines both teams will use standard 6-2-2-1 defenses, with the linebackers stationed two yards behind the defensive tackles but permitted to drift with flankers. Any deviation will be an illegal defensive formation and a five-yard penalty will be called.

Reason for playing the game with set defenses is to enable the teams to concentrate almost exclusively on offensive tactics in practice.

It was summed up by Eldon Janne, associate director of the contest when he said, "It's much easier to teach defense than offense. It's impossible for the players to master their blocking assignments for variations against anything from a 4-man to an 8-man line in only two weeks. Therefore, if the offensive team knows what it will face it can bring more variation to its attack and execute its plays better. The general result will be plenty of touchdowns and a thrilling game. That's what the fans have indicated they want and that's what this system will give them. We're confident that this unique experiment will produce the most colorful game ever viewed in Oregon."

Corvallis had claimed championship, when Cottage Grove downed them 7-0 but the touchdown was called back on some minor technicality, then to prove who was best Grove defeated Corvallis to become undisputed Willamette Valley champs. Here is a writeup of the Cottage Grove-Eugene battle.

In a closely contested and rather rough football game Saturday Cottage Grove high downed Eugene high on the local gridiron by a score of 7-0. Cellars did the star playing for the victors and in the first quarter made the touchdown which resulted in the only points made for either side. Matthews also made a hit with the audience.

In the second quarter Cellars caught a passed ball and carried it through to the goal, but lost it by time being called a few seconds before he crossed the line. Coach Earl made a clean kick following the first touchdown.

Eugene came near scoring in both the third and last quarters. In the third quarter the half was within eight yards of the goal when Cottage Grove recovered it on a fumble made in a pass. Cellars did some star work in intercepting passed balls but in the last quarter after Brumbaugh had been knocked out the visitors rushed Grove goal with four or five passes and for a few moments it looked as if they would succeed in getting a touchdown.

Both teams got out of several bad holes that looked threatening. The Eugene lads said they expected a practice game but had reasons to change their minds.

Cottage Grove scored a touchdown in the first quarter and held the visitors scoreless until the last minute of the third quarter when they also got a touchdown. In the last quarter the visitors tried a place kick but were unsuccessful. Eugene's final touchdown was made by a wide run around left end which the Cottage Grove players were unable to stop. The visitors kicked the goal, making the final score 13-6.

Kime at quarterback and Powell at center played the feature game for the locals. Cottage Grove's only score resulted from a punt received by Kime, when the pigskin was returned 40 yards, and following an off-tackle buck and line plunge, Kime carried it across the goal line. Powell played a perfect defensive game, breaking through the adversary's line time and time again. Eugene's right tackle, Thomas, featured for the visitors.

The teams were pretty equally matched for weight, but the visitors were the faster and showed the result of practice. The Cottage Grove lads have had but two weeks' drilling but Coach Jewett has been successful in whipping them into pretty good shape in that time and said the boys play like future champs. Six of them are under 15 years of age and five had never been in even a practice game before.
