School Census Count Basis of Oregon School Funds, Coming Year

The school census count for Oregon for 1950 was 369,957, a gain of 1,537 over the count of the previous year. The 1950 count is the basis for levying the \$80.00 per census child for the basic school fund and distributing \$10.00 per census child for the county school fund. The figures were obtained from the Oregon Voter and according to the Voter shows a real count this time.

Under this count Lane county had 34,345 pupils a gain of 6.2 per cent over the previous year. The greatest gain is shown by Jefferson county with a gain of 14.1 per cent and 1,602 pupils. Greatest loss was the area in Multnomah county outside of Portland a 13.7 loss.

JAMES EDWARD JACKSON, JR.

The FBI has requested alert citizens and law enforcement agencies to be on the lookout for James Edward Jackson, Jr., Southern Regional Director of the Communist Party, USA, who was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury at New York, New York, on June 20, 1951, on a charge of conspiracy to advocate the violent overthrow of the government. A description of Jackson is as follows:

Age, 36, born November 29, 1914, Richmond, Virginia; height, 5'6 1/2"; weight, 160 pounds; build, medium; hair, black, curly, bald in front; eyes, brown; race, Negro; nationality, American; scars and marks, small star scar outer corner of left eye.

Jackson received a Doctor's Degree at Howard University of Pharmacy in Washington, D. C. He has resided in Richmond, Virginia; Washington, D. C.; Arlington, Virginia; and in Birmingham, Alabama.

He has been employed as a druggist, labor organizer, writer and lecturer. He is described as well-groomed and neat in appearance. He sometimes wears a mustache.

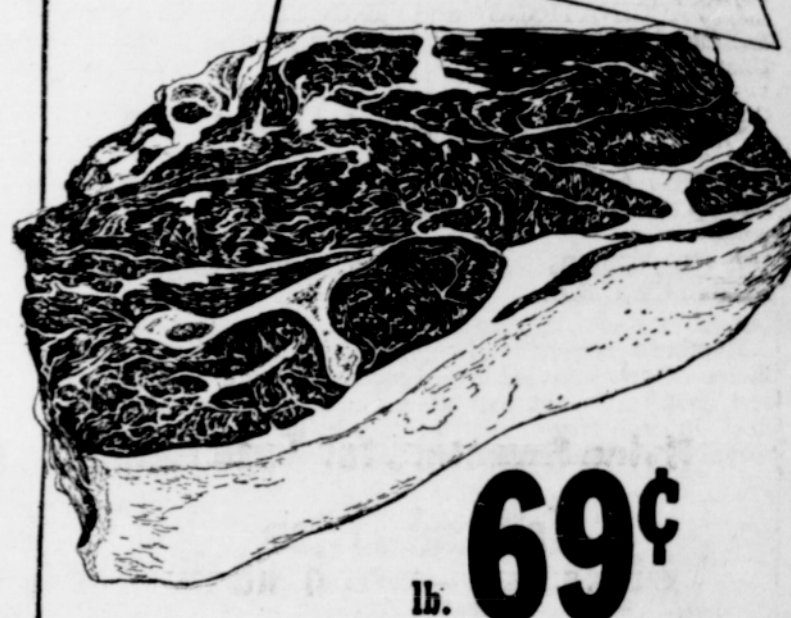

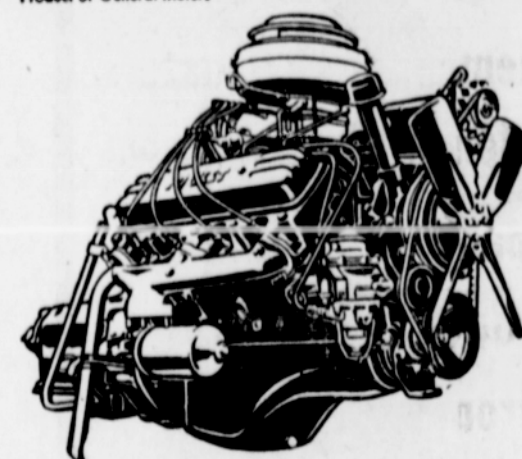
