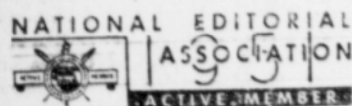
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ARMY SALVAGE

What could be a valuable lesson to the brass in the Pentagon comes in a recent report from Far Eastern headquarters in Tokyo.

Sixty-five per cent of the trucks and jeeps now hauling supplies to American forces in Korea were rebuilt in Japan by the army from World War II derelicts abandoned on lonely Pacific islands.

The report goes on to say that rebuilding these vehicles and putting them into immediate service was essential, at one stage of the Korean war, to survival of our men. Trucks and jeeps were not available from any other source, in spite of all the spending and wasting of appropriated funds in this country.

Not only was the restoration of the jeeps and trucks a "must" for our men, the action has resulted in the saving of a tremendous sum. This is explained by the difference in costs of rebuilding the vehicles and of new ones—1,200 in the case of jeeps and an average of \$4500 for trucks.

Since the North Korean Reds invaded the Southern Republic, 43,000 jeeps and trucks have been rebuilt and made available to our troops. As many as 216 vehicles have been returned to duty in a single day, rolling off the improvised "assembly line" under their own power. In addition, the ordnance men in Japan have rebuilt and restored approximately 500,000 tires for the vehicles.

Not only should this example be followed by the Pentagon, repairing and restoring such vehicles and other military equipment as a money saver, but it could be effective in bringing the entire defense program up to date.

It is true that Russia and her satellites still rely on antiquated motor and horse drawn equipment, even these World War II supplies could give us the advantage. Indeed, some observers say that our superiority in transporting supplies paved the way to our success in Korea and, if this observation is correct, then we may not be so far behind in the armament race after all.

That is, if the brass in Washington can get the "all things made new and more expensive" idea dispelled.

LITTLE PURCHASERS

Among all the astronomical million- and billion-dollar figures tossed around in discussing the defense rearmament program, \$25 wouldn't seem to mean much. But when it comes to paying for the defense program, \$25 is the figure that does a tremendous part of the job.

The U. S. Treasury's latest report on defense bond sales shows that purchases of \$25 and \$50 bonds—the standby of the working man—are currently 11 per cent higher than last year. On the other hand, sales of the giant \$1,000 bonds—favorite denomination of the big investor, have dropped 39 per cent below last year.

So it would seem that the working man is the one who is doing most of the digging-down to support the government's program. Even so, plans are all set to put on a major selling campaign for defense bonds in the fall. One of the ways suggested by the government to boost sales would be asking workers to take their overtime pay and "productivity" bonuses in bonds instead of cash. This, of course, would be strictly on a voluntary basis, but could be a very effective way of saving some of that extra cash.

Tompkins Qualifies

PENSACOLA, Fla., July 26. Naval Aviation Cadet George E. Tompkins of the United States Navy took off and landed his SNJ "Texan" trainer six successive times recently aboard the USS Monterey, cruising in the Gulf of Mexico, to complete his aircraft carrier qualifications.

Cadet Tompkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Jacobs of 1348 N. Niagara, Burbank, Calif., attended Riverside College and has had two years active duty and two years inactive duty with the Naval Reserve, in the enlisted status prior to his acceptance into the Naval Aviation Cadet program.

He reported to Pensacola, Fla., "The Annapolis of the Air" in April of 1950 and has completed a stringent schedule in military, academic, physical and flight training.

From Pensacola he has been sent to advanced training at Corpus Christi, Texas. This will be a four month syllabus in combat type aircraft. Graduation from advanced training will win him the coveted Navy wings of gold.

In a letter to Tompkins' parents from F. M. Hughes, Rear Admiral, U. S. Navy, Chief of Naval Air basic training, he says: "May I offer my congratulations to you on your son's behalf for the fine record he has maintained in this command. You can take justifiable pride in his successful completion of this difficult and competitive part of his flight training."

Tompkins is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Fred L. Erwin of Cottage Grove, and with whom he made his home for several years.

Gilbert Appointed To Freedom Post

Appointment of Dr. James Henry Gilbert of Eugene, well-known Oregon educator, as regional director of the 1951 Crusade for Freedom in Lane Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine and Jackson counties, is announced by Tom Lawson McCall, state Crusade chairman.

Dr. Gilbert, professor of economics at the University of Oregon since 1920, writer and lecturer, will set up county and city Crusade organizations in the region for which he has accepted service to help in the campaign to raise Oregon's quota of \$40,000 of the \$3,500,000 national goal for the purpose of expanding the facilities of Radio Free Europe in the bloodless battle against Russian propaganda and the spread of Communism. The intensive campaign for voluntary contributions to the cause, nationally and in Oregon, will open on Labor Day.

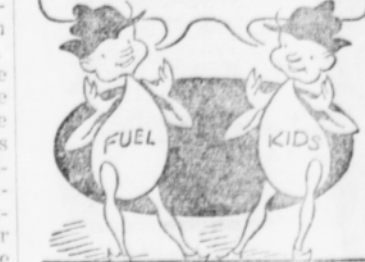
