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Way Back When

Back in the early forties the football seasons were all pretty good, and seemed to improve every year. Here are some games from these seasons.

Here is a writeup on a wide open, fast scoring ball game.

A highly rejuvenated Lions team took the field last Saturday at Civic Stadium in Eugene to play one of the worst mud battles in their history and to eke out a slender 2-0 victory over the highly prized Uni High Golden Tide. The Lions won not only a brilliant game but the right to share the laurels with their co-champions Uni High.

The tempo of the game picked up in the second half during the dying moments of the third quarter when McKibben quick-kicked to the Tide's 10-yard stripe. Uni's halfback, quickly passed, missing his objective slightly, but found an eager receiver in the person of Tom Jones who returned it to the Tide's 23-yard line. The Lions battered their way to the Tide's 1-foot marker, where McKibben again hit the center and forced the ball to the 1-inch line. McKibben tried one more punch at guard but piled up for no gain and the ball went to Uni High on downs. Stump immediately went back to kick, but this time the Lion line was just as determined as the Tide line was before. The entire left side of the line seeped through and the punt was blocked by Elmer Quinne and bounded behind the end zone for an automatic safety and two points. The Lions again threatened in the last moments of the game when Doug (almost a hero) Johnson bobbled a touchdown pass as the game ended.

The lineup was LE Seagoe; LT Aubrey; LG Plueard; C McCoy; RG Jenkins; RT G. Dugan; Q Jones; LH Bauder; RH Minor; F McKibben.

Scores for the season were CG-7 Alumni-12; CG-0 North Bend-19; CG-13 Reedsport-6; CG-25 Springfield-6; CG-6 Roseburg-15; CG-2 Uni High-0; CG-19 Sweet Home-13; CG-26 Junction City-0.

In 1943 CG had a good season with only one loss to three wins and two tied games, which ended them up as tri-county champs of '43.

Here are scores of the season: CG-39 Sweet Home-0; CG-7 Roseburg-6; CG-19 Reedsport-13; CG-13 Reedsport-6; CG-25 Springfield-6; CG-6 Roseburg-15; CG-2 Uni High-0; CG-19 Sweet Home-13; CG-26 Junction City-0.

season of 1945 when Cottage Grove went as far as the semi-finals of state play. This year was the present coach Bob Dusenberry's first year as coach of Cottage Grove High. (Mr. Dusenberry is now in the midst of writing the story of his life and how to jump from manager to player to head coach to trainer in ten easy lessons). Coach French's last year as coach of CG was in 1944 and his boys went through the entire season without a loss but were denied the right to play in the state playoffs because of the size of Cottage Grove.

Cottage Grove added 39 more points to their score from 1940 to the 1945 Uni High-Cottage Grove game when they swamped them 41-0. Here is a blow by blow description of the game.

The Cottage Grove Lions clinched at least a tie for the Tri-County league championship by defeating a hard-fighting Uni Hi eleven, 41-0 at Kelly Field Friday night.

The victory strengthened Coach Bob Dusenberry's charges bid for a state championship playoff. This was the twelfth straight victory for the Lions in the past two seasons.

Noel Campbell, the Grovers' charging fullback, was again the big run of the T-formation attack. He scored 14 of the Lions' points and personally gained 224 yards from rushing, nearly 4 times as much as the entire Uni Hi eleven.

Westfir copped one more run in the fifth and that was all she wrote while Grove got two in the third off a homer with one on by Arbuckle, one in the fifth off a homer by Kinsland and four in the sixth off five straight hits.
