Tourists Forget Safety Measures

State safety officials expressed concern today over several reported traffic accidents involving tourists who forget common-sense safety rules when they stop their cars to view Oregon scenery.

The traffic safety division reported that at least one person was killed during July by getting out of a car and stepping onto the highway directly into the path of an oncoming car.

Another common mistake, the division said, is walking with instead of against oncoming vehicles, and it should go without saying that it is never safe to alight from the left-hand side, or traffic side, of a car.
