Slogan 'Hi Ho Come to the Fair' Calls Oregonians to Fair No. 86

With emphasis on "Eight Great Days" and a slogan of "Hi Ho Come to the Fair," the 86th Oregon State Fair opens in Salem this year on Saturday, September 1, with every expectation, according to Leo G. Spitzbart, general manager for the past 17 years, that all previous expositions will be topped both as to variety of exhibits and attractions as well as to attendance.

Stressing the new opening day of Saturday instead of the almost traditional Labor Day date, Mr. Spitzbart pointed out that the change was made by the recently appointed State Fair Commission. "We are working might and main," he said, "to make this year's Fair truly outstanding in every department, from livestock to farm machinery; from our nightly stage show to our fun zone attractions; and, from our afternoon horse races to our speeded-up horse show and rodeo."

Under the immediate supervision of Dick Richards, assistant Fair manager, the livestock department promises to bring one of the greatest aggregations of Oregon's champion animals. Every effort is being made to provide the finest facilities for livestock, poultry and rabbit exhibitors.

4-H and FFA entry indications forecast a banner representation of the state's hard-working youngsters from farms and ranches, go-

ing all-out in their showings and demonstrations.

Farm machinery and equipment displays will be interesting and most extensive in view of a recent policy change on the part of some manufacturers.

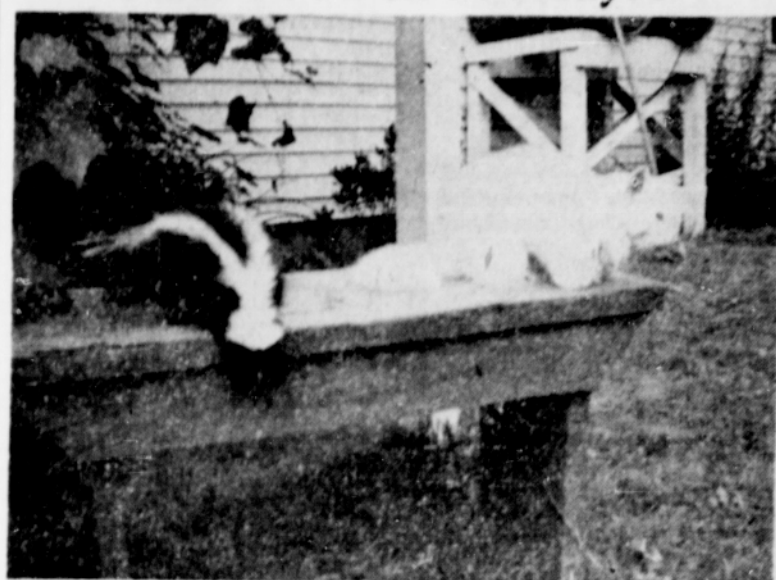
"Some distributors and manufacturers," said Mr. Spitzbart, "have indicated they will not exhibit this year because of a changed policy which calls for more participation in county fairs and exhibition only in some of the largest state expositions of the eastern, southern and midwestern parts of the country. We offered them space at practically their own terms."

Entertainment features at the 1951 Oregon State Fair will be numerous and no expense is being spared to arrange programs that will delight old and young alike, with something for everybody to see and enjoy.

Tying in with the 86th birthday aspect of the exposition, an Old Time Fiddlers' Contest and old-time dances will be held nightly on the Fairgrounds, with participation by the fiddle-famed of the northwest seemingly assured.

Despite rising costs everywhere else, the 1951 Oregon State Fair will maintain the same gate admission price as last year, namely, 50 cents including federal tax, with children under 12 admitted free.
