## Battered OSC Team Will Play Huskies

Oregon State College, Corvallis—A battered and bruised Oregon State football team, victim of a 35-14 defeat by California's rejuvenated Bears, stepped up preparations this week for another "toughie" against the University of Washington in Seattle next Saturday.

There was little to smile about in the Orange camp. In losing to Cal, the Beavers ended up minus their regular right halfback, Bill Anderson. The latter suffered internal injuries and was left in Oakland hospital for observation. Other OSC men injured at Berkeley were Bill West, Cub Houck and Pete Palmer, but Trainer Bill Robertson is of the opinion all will be ready by Saturday.

Oregon State's sturdy line was pushed around for the first time this season at Berkeley and the backfield showed practically nothing on the ground. The passing of Quarterback Gene Morrow and Left Half Dave Mann was the finest of the season, however. The line completed 19 out of 31 for 165 yards, with Morrow hitting 12 out of 19.

Washington, pre-season choice to walk right into the Rose Bowl, lost to Stanford last week end, 14-7. The Huskies are loaded with veterans, however, and will be anxious to redeem their fast-fading Bowl hopes by trimming OSC. Their best effort to date was a 63-6 trouncing of the University of Oregon in Portland.

Praised for his work against the Bears was Sam Baker, junior fullback. Coach Kip Taylor, unhappy with most everyone else, lauded Baker for his hard-running. It was Baker who slammed across for two last-quarter Beaver touchdowns, and he also picked up 60 of the Beavers' 97 gross yardage rushing.

If Anderson is not available for action, Taylor probably will start Sophomore Jack Peterson at right half. Peterson was in the first unit in the opener against Michigan State, but has been out of action since because of injuries. He played some in the Cal tilt.

Also scheduled for more work is Gene Taft, a regular tailback in 1950 but a substitute for Mann this year. Taft returned a punt for one long touchdown run and had another TD jump called back because of a clipping penalty.

Oregon's legislature honored the state's war dead by designing U.S. Highway 99 as a memorial highway. Now several Blue Star Memorial roadside picnic areas have been added to the highway system as further remembrance of Oregon servicemen.

## Scouts Give Program On Civilian Defense

The Boy Scout Circus November 10 in Eugene will feature a skit demonstrating the "do's and don'ts" of civilian defense. A recent meeting there focused attention on first aid training for the general public. Two Eugene men are attending a two-week civil defense training course conducted by the federal government. Portland civil defense will send four persons to the training school.

The director of the Mt. Hood area appealed to residents of all ages, from Cherryville to Government Camp, for participation in the local civil defense program. The new director for Klamath county, Joe LaClair, has altered his organization to more closely follow state and federal civil defense plans. The set-up includes, deputy, directors for fire, police, medical, engineering, aid and welfare, communications, utilities, operations, public information and education and personnel.

State civil defense workers are continuing their field trips to CD units throughout the state to see if the assignments given each county for police and fire reserves, mobile first aid teams, medical-hospital teams, welfare teams and rescue units are within the capabilities of each area.

In Portland, a special series of civil defense classes for the public are being held Monday through Thursday each week in five public schools. First aid is now a part of the curriculum for seventh to tenth graders in Portland schools. Teachers are given civil defense instruction as part of their inservice training program.
