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RESPONSIBILITIES OF CITIZENSHIP
There are a good many youth organizations today that attempt to teach the youth the responsibilities of citizenship in addition to the public schools, but the fortunes of these organizations depend on adult leadership. Organizations most familiar to us are the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts and the 4-H clubs, the latter devoted to the training of the rural youth.

We were glad to see an attempt made by Mrs. Jeanne Morton and others in south Lane county to revitalize the 4-H club work in this area, which has meant so much to us in the past. We can recall in the not too distant past when the 4-H club work was an important project for the rural youth of South Lane and when the area gained statewide recognition in its training program. Several outstanding club members were produced during the period and at least two were good enough to get an expense free trip to Chicago.

Failure to keep the club work at a high pitch was due to lack of adult leadership, which is usual to the ebbing fortune of work of this kind. The need is still here however and perhaps the challenge is greater than ever because of our increasing rural population.

Agricultural possibilities have been sadly neglected in this section during the past five or six years and what little farming that has been done has been largely on a part time basis. Even though only small scale farming is possible, we have not lived up to our opportunities in getting anything like the maximum return.

There is much improvement to be desired and this improvement can be made if the rural people want to better their standard of living. This is where 4-H club work comes in because this club work not only makes for better citizenship, but better homemaking and farming as well. When we stop to consider that about 65 percent of our population lives in the rural sections, we can grasp what a 4-H program means to the future of our country.

Nobody perhaps realizes the lack of interest in one of our basic industries better than the South Lane fair board. Since the inception of the South Lane fair, the board has struggled to keep the fair going with the hope that this event would stimulate interest in better farming. The 4-H club work is an important part of the fair; in fact it is the most important part.

The rural areas stand to benefit immeasurably by improved farm conditions. We must help ourselves, no outside influence can make for better living, if we wait for someone else.

If we want to measure up to our responsibilities in developing better small farming and livestock farming, let's support worthwhile organizations like the 4-H club. This club trains tomorrow's citizens.

Russell Alford who injured his hip in a fall while hunting has now discarded his crutches and is able to go on with his farm work.

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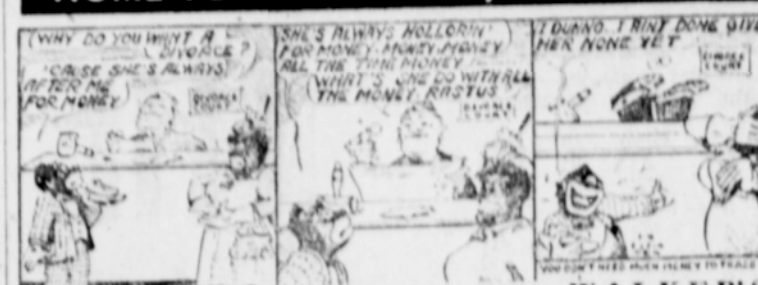
