Single, Team Score Record Set by Cubs

Five out of ten of Wes Malcolm's points came in in the nick of time last Friday night in the Cottage Grove-Roseburg return game basketball tussle, the last one being in the last three seconds of play putting Grove on the long end of a 33-32 score.

In the first two minutes of the game the Indians racked up seven points before the bewildered Lions could get rolling. Two minutes later the score was 9-9 and then the fight began.

Roseburg again took the lead when they forged ahead 13-11, but at the end of the half the Grove offense began to click and the score stood 17-16 for the Lions.

Malcolm Does Damage

At the end of the third quarter the score stood 23-21 for the Indians, but three buckets later Grove took a 27-25 lead. Again the lead changed hands when the Indians edged ahead 29-28.

It was here that half of Malcolm's points did the most damage. After Roseburg put in another free throw Malcolm bounced back with a bucket tying up a 30-30 ball game. Then a shifty Roseburg guard potted a long one, but again Malcolm came back with a basket making the score 32-32.

Roseburg Sportsmanship

It was here that the Roseburg fans displayed a very unsportsmanlike attitude when they made distracting noises during a free throw attempt by Radway. He missed the shot and again Grove had the chance to forge ahead as Duer stepped up to the free throw line. The noisemaking of the Roseburg fans was probably the main reason for Duer's missing the shot.

With two seconds left to play Malcolm stepped up to the free throw line and, despite the roaring of the cheering section and a Gene Krupa in the band, made the point and increased Grove's undefeated win streak.

After the first two minutes of play the whole team played heads up ball, facing a much stronger Roseburg team, and should be congratulated on a fine game.

HOLIDAY COSTUMES EASILY FIREPROOFED FOR SAFETY

Candles and children's costumes often play a traditional role in Christmas celebrations. But every year, one or more lives are horribly sacrificed by a fatal combination of fire and clothing.

Parents can act now to prevent such tragedies, says Miss Lucy Lane, extension clothing specialist at Oregon State college, by making sure gauzy angel gowns and baggy Santa suits are fireproof.

If costumes are made at home, fireproof the materials first, she advises. Here are her directions.

Dissolve one pound of ammonium sulphamate in a gallon of warm water. Dip the fabrics in this solution, wetting them thoroughly. Then allow to dry.

The solution does not affect the feel or appearance of the fabric.
