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Chest Falls Short; Agency Budget Cut

About \$5,000 more than in any previous year was wanted in the recent Community Chest drive, yet the goal is not yet reached, according to the latest report from Robert Cross, county campaign chairman.

At a meeting of the Chest board of directors held recently Cross said that \$149,597.45 had been collected, but that the goal was not reached. This was highest amount ever donated, but not enough as the needs were greater than ever before, he said.

The budget committee together with the executive committee of the Chest plan a meeting soon to determine budget adjustments for the 28 Chest agencies.

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Session May Be Set To Hear Water Plan

A special session of the City Council to consider a Gowdyville water proposal is expected to be called for Monday, December 17. However, according to Mayor F. H. Doleman, as of Wednesday the area had not indicated it was ready to present its official proposal that will try to solve the water problem in that district.

People Agree

Dr. C. H. Kime, a Gowdyville resident and one of the proponents of city water for the area, said that at a session Monday night, December 10, held at the City Hall that people in the area were "in

virtual agreement" on the plan presented to the council at its last session. (This plan was for users in the area to build their own line and sell it to the city.)

The Council, upon the advice of City Attorney Herbert Lombard, told Gowdyville people that they should draw up a proposal or contract to present to the Council before it could be considered.

Election Set

In the meantime, a water district election is scheduled for December 18, just one day after the expected special council session. How the people vote in this election is expected to depend on the council's decision on the new proposal.

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
