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RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Barbecued Corn and Meat Balls

Broadcast: January 5, 1952

1 lb. ground lean beef
1/2 cup rolled oats
few grains pepper
1/2 cup Pet Milk
2 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon paprika

2 tablespoons hot fat
1/2 cup finely cut onion
barbecue sauce
1 1/2 cups water
No. 101 can drained, whole kernel corn

Mix beef, oats, 1 teaspoon salt, pepper and milk thoroughly. Dip hands in water, then shape mixture into 8 balls. Roll meat balls in mixture of flour, paprika and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Brown in skillet on all sides in hot fat. Add onion and cook slowly 5 minutes. Stir in mixture of barbecue sauce and water. Cover and simmer 45 minutes, turning meat balls now and then. Add corn and heat thoroughly. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.

You Will Need:

Pet Milk, Canned Whole Kernel Corn, Ground Beef, Rolled Oats, Onions, Barbecue Sauce.

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
