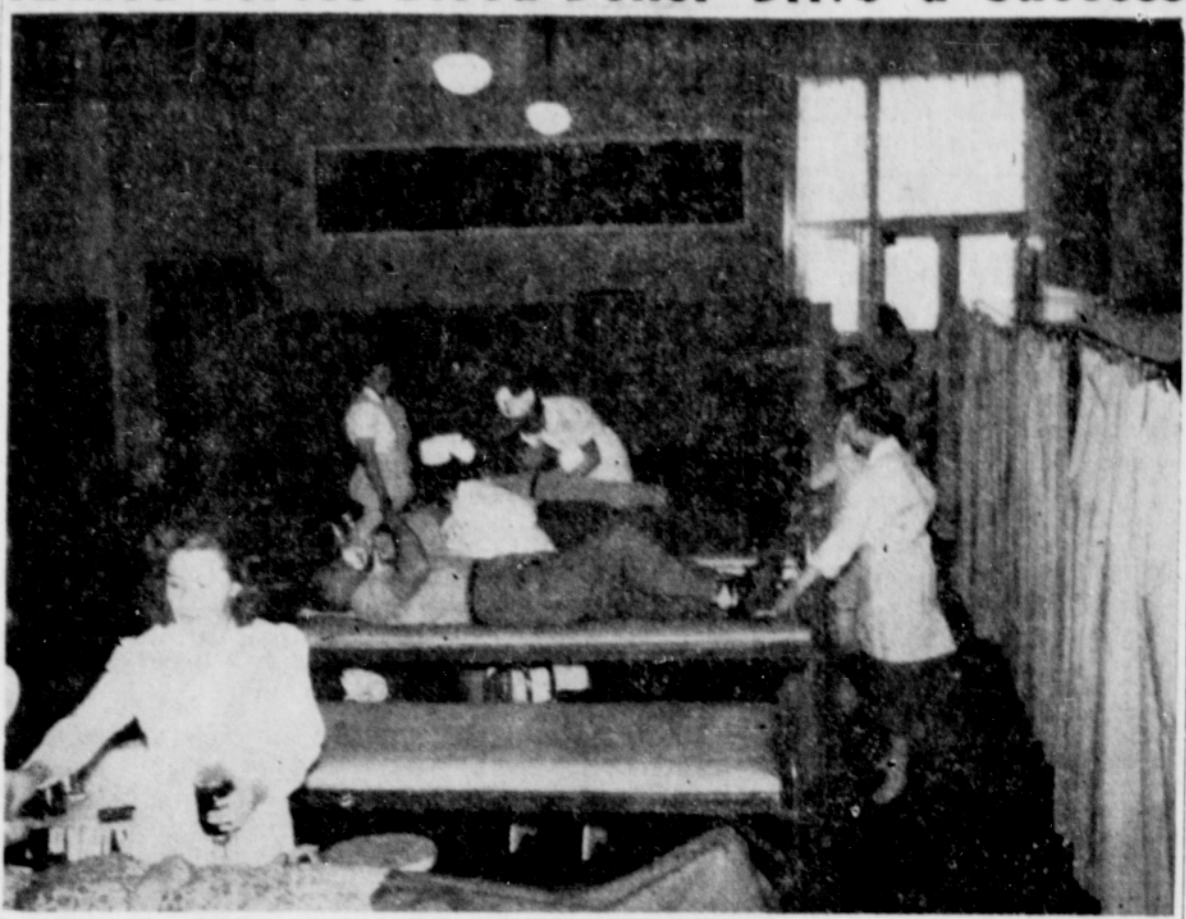

carried in a year's end report on National Foundation activities in Oregon in 1951. Other highlights of the report included the disclosure that new stock received at the Northwest regional equipment pool of the National Foundation in 1951 consisted of 15 new iron lungs and three portable lungs. The pool, in Portland, is one of six in the United States.
The report also showed that the Foundation distributed through Oregon schools in 1951, 290,000 polio pointer-information cards which explain the "do's and don'ts" of polio. "There has been no patient attacked by polio in the last five years who has not been aided in some way through National Foundation programs," Dr. Hedlund said.
