Two-State License Agreement Expires

Oregon's reciprocal truck licensing agreement with Idaho expired December 31, truck owners were reminded this week by Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry.

Trucks operating in both Oregon and Idaho will have to obtain license plates from both states as of January 1, 1952, Newberry pointed out.

Effectuated are all motor vehicles having gross weight in excess of 5000 pounds and all trailers. Provisions covering private passenger carrying vehicles remain unchanged.

Conferences Fall

Newberry said repeated conferences with Idaho motor vehicle authorities failed to result in continuation of the agreement. Idaho officials at a November meeting said an act of the 1951 Idaho legislature prohibits reciprocal licensing agreements with all other states on vehicles in excess of 5000 pounds gross weight. Officials of the two states met in other lengthy conferences in January and October of this year.

The Idaho action does not alter Oregon's existing agreements with Washington and California, although those two states will join Oregon in collecting fees from Idaho trucks.

Oregon farm plates may be issued to Idaho farmers even though their farms are not located in Oregon. Fees for farm plates are lower than those for other commercial vehicles.

HOUSEHOLD HINT

New Plymouths to Be Displayed Here on Friday, January 4th

The new Plymouth for 1952 will go on display in Cottage Grove, Friday, January 4, at Cecil Beck Motors and McCoy Motors.

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Governors Invited To Ore. Centennial

SALEM (Special) — Governor Douglas McKay has invited the governors of ten states whose histories are most directly concerned with the Old Oregon Trail to attend the celebration of Oregon's Covered Wagon Centennial opening in Portland January 22 and 23.

The Centennial, sponsored by the Old Oregon Trails Association and a special statewide Governor's Committee, will get off to an auspicious start with the world premiere of "Bend of the River," a Universal International Studios' technicolor production filmed in Oregon. It stars James Stewart, Arthur Kennedy, Julia Adams and Rock Hudson.

Widespread Coverage

According to the Oregon governor's letter of invitation, Universal International Studios and the local sponsoring groups are arranging for comprehensive newsreel, radio and newspaper coverage of the event. Forty syndicated writers will be on hand to describe the efforts of this state and its distinguished visitors to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the peak of the covered wagon migration to the Oregon Country.

Present plans for the first day Centennial kick-off include a banquet honoring the governors and movie stars, a sternwheeler race on the river, and what is "hopefully expected to be the world's largest square dance." The agenda for January 23 calls for a morning parade through Portland, visits to the Veterans' and Shriners' hospitals, a chuck-wagon dinner of all-Oregon delicacies, "Bend of the River" world premiere at J. J. Parker's Theater, and a full-dress ball.
