New Councilmen Take Office at Meeting Jan. 7

CRESWELL — Councilmen elect V. W. Johnston, F. A. Everson and H. W. Taylor were sworn into office at the monthly meeting of the city council Monday evening. Others serving are H. N. Traxler, E. J. Greenwood and T. W. Walkup with Carlyle Scarborough as mayor.

A lengthy discussion was held relative to the violations of the building ordinance and the body voted to enforce the law to the letter. It read, "No person shall build, enlarge or alter a well, structure or building unless he submits in duplicate to the fire and water committee a plan of proposed work together with a statement of the material to be used. In turn such committee shall, if the plan is complete, issue a permit." Anyone who does not comply will be subject to a fine of not more than \$50 or imprisonment in the city jail not more than 20 days. Each day without a permit will constitute a separate offense; also a structure not conforming to this ordinance shall be subject to removal.
