Lincoln-Mercury Cars Distributed From Calif. Plant

A major change in the mechanics of distributing Lincoln and Mercury cars to western dealers, and a realignment of personnel handling their distribution, was announced recently by Henry B. Daniels, regional sales manager of the Lincoln-Mercury Division of Ford Motor Company.

The new procedure transfers all functions of car distribution from the region's four sales districts in Oakland, Seattle, Los Angeles, and Denver to the newly-formed car distribution department at the Los Angeles assembly plant. Cars for most of the dealers in the 11 western states are assembled there.

Head Named Appointed to head up the new department is Dale M. Stewart, who previously served as plant distribution manager. David W. Walker will be in charge of distribution in the Los Angeles district and the Salt Lake City area. J. D. McReynolds has been transferred from the Oakland district to handle cars for the Oakland and Seattle districts.

At the same time, it was announced that Earl C. Roget has been promoted within the department to supervisor of the scheduling section.

Increases Delivery According to Daniels, the reorganization is designed to increase the speed and flexibility with which automobiles are ordered by dealers, scheduled into production, and delivered according to customer's specifications.

"This direct dealer-to-plant channel of communication will provide excellent service to both customers and our dealer organization," Daniels said. "It gives us a central distribution nerve-center for the region that will give prompt information on the status of car orders and efficient coordination of all ordering, scheduling and shipping records."

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Mail Costs Rise

Postoffice patrons met heavier tolls for many postal services when they went to do business there for the first time in January.

The doubled rate on "penny" postcards was felt by most, with the two-cent charge perhaps discouraging their use in some cases in favor of regular letter mail, which remains at three cents. The two-cent cards will not be cheap in large amounts, either. On purchases of 50 or more a 10 percent surcharge will be added.

Other Increases Other increased rates apply to catalogs, special delivery letters (which go up from 15 to 20 cents), to registered letters, and to insurance and COD fees.

Effective January 1 a restriction on parcel post mailing lowered the maximum weight limit from 70 down to 20 pounds for parcels mailed from certain classes of postoffices to certain destinations. The far-reaching parcel restrictions are so complicated that patrons mailing any parcel of 20 pounds or over should check with the postoffice.

Other changes on second and third class mails will become effective April 1 and July 1.

Planners Remind County's Builders Of Permit Penalty

The Lane County Planning Commission has reminded all persons constructing buildings outside of incorporated cities that the penalty clause for building without a permit is in effect but will not be enforced until after January 15.

A building permit ordinance has been in effect since January 1, 1949 with the penalty clause added in November, 1951. This doubles the permit fee for anyone who starts construction before obtaining a building permit. The county Building Department has announced it will withhold application of the penalty to give those now building without a permit an opportunity to obtain a permit without penalty.

The building code ordinance has also been modified stating no new residences may be occupied until the sewage disposal system has been approved by the County Building Inspector or the County Health Officer.

These ordinances apply only to unincorporated areas.

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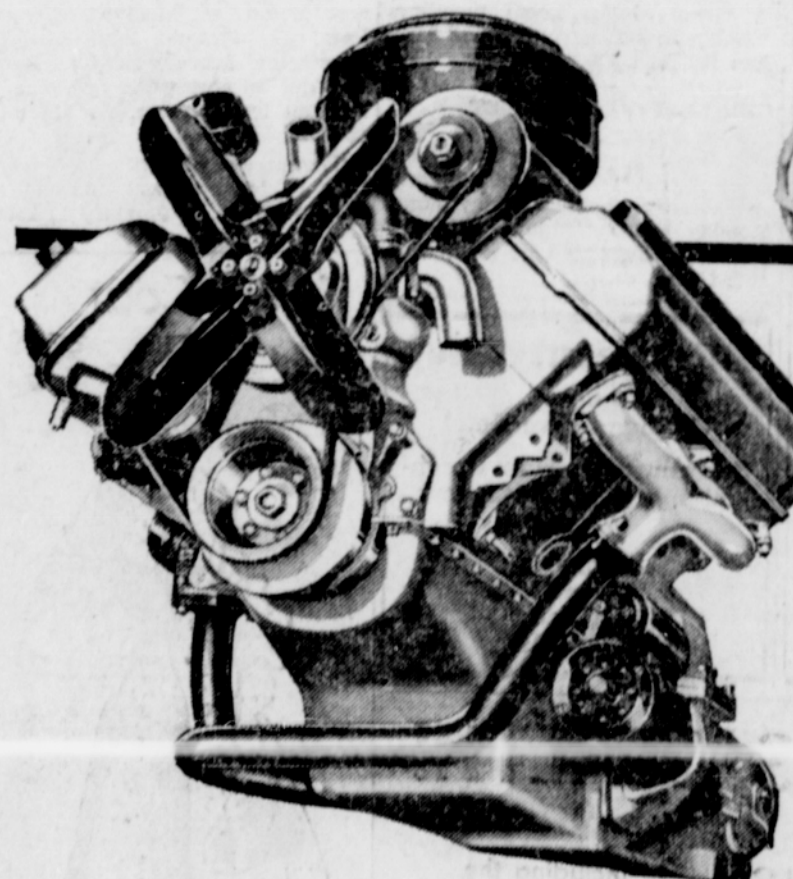
