Lions Lose Tussle With Eugene High, Take Second Place

Eugene high school's Axemen went into the District 6-1 lead by defeating Cottage Grove's Lions 45-37 in a hard fought game played on the Lions floor here Tuesday night. Up to this tilt they had won two district games apiece with no losses. The Lions take second place.

The score was tied twice—12 to 12 at the end of the first quarter, and 22-22 at the half. Eugene went into the lead for the first time in the game early in the third quarter, with the period ending 36-32, Eugene. In the third period Isley's baskets tied it up two times.

In the last period Eugene went ahead to make it 40-32 and then 45-37, with Cottage Grove scoring only 5 points in this part of the tilt.

The "B" squad also lost its game, with Eugene high defeating them 35-27. Eugene led at the end of the first quarter 8-7, with Cottage Grove forging into the lead 19-17 at the half. Eugene led again 29-21 at the end of the third period, and with four minutes to go the score was still in their favor, 35-25.

Thomas, a sub, scored one basket as the gun sounded, but Eugene won 35-27. Sloan, CG center, made all the points in the first half.

Way Back When

We received a letter from an ex-gridiron great who played on the Cottage Grove eleven back in 1903, the year and the only year that Grove ever defeated Eugene high. Elza (Harry) Crow, now living in Tulare, Calif., sent the letter and enclosed a picture of that Eugene team which is now appearing in the paper.

The letter goes as follows:

Editor Cottage Grove Sentinel
Cottage Grove, Oregon

Dear Sir:
The picture of the 1903 Cottage Grove High School football team which defeated the Eugene High School appeared in your November 15, 1951, issue. This was interesting to the writer—perhaps because I played in that game. Cottage Grove had a tough aggregation. Buck Starr, the coach, had a lot of football experience at the U. of O. He deserved much credit in putting together a group that could take the measure of the Eugenians. Some reportorial wit in one of the Eugene papers stated: "Eugene strikes a Hill. Much harm done. Many Knox received. Mustache protected Berry. Martin stays Crow."

Enclosed find picture of team defeated by Cottage Grove. Perhaps the above will be of interest to you and your pioneer readers. Greetings to Knox, Harms, Hill and all "old timers."

Oregon's basketball Ducks met San Jose State and College of the Pacific for the first time during the 1951-52 season.

1951-52 is Oregon's Diamond Jubilee, the first classes being held in 1876-77. The first student body numbered 171.

First Place Ducks Will Meet Huskies

University of Oregon, Eugene—Oregon's Northern Division leading Ducks will travel to Seattle to meet the powerful Washington Huskies on January 18 and 19.

Coach Bill Borchers' crew completed eight games in 14 days by sweeping the opening conference series at McArthur Court from Washington State. The double win gave the surprising Webfoots undisputed possession of first place at least until they meet the Huskies, heavy favorites to repeat as conference champions.

Last Three Seasons

Oregon has had a miserable time in the Edmondson Pavilion the last three seasons and have not won a game at Seattle since Dick Wilkins sank a 45-foot shot in the last seconds of the 1948 opener to give the Ducks a 49-48 win. Last season the Huskies won the first game easily and then were hard put to hold off the rallying Ducks to grab a 61-60 victory in the second game.

Coach Borchers gave his regulars a three-day rest following the Cougar series to catch up on their studies. The Ducks missed the first three days of winter term while finishing up a tour of the San Francisco Bay area following Christmas.

Peterson Stars
Against the Cougars fine backboard play, particularly by Bob Peterson, had much to do with the double win. Peterson set a new division and conference record the second night when he captured 25 rebounds to smash the mark of 21 he had established in the opening game of the series.

The Webfoot regulars accounted for 94 of the 118 points scored by the home crew in that series and Coach Borchers is expected to open the same five again against the Huskies. Peterson and Mel Street-er will be at forward, Chet Hunt at center and Capt. Ken Hout and Ken Wegner at guard.

The remainder of the travel squad will probably include Jim Vranizan and Keith Farnam at forward, Henry Bonneman at center and Barney Holland, Bob Hawes, Ron Bottler, and Bud Covey at guard.

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Game Fish Rules Issued For 1952

Oregon's tentative sport fishing regulations for 1952 were set in Portland Saturday, January 12, by the game commission following a public hearing at commission headquarters.

Opening dates for trout season in the tentative regulations are April 19 in Zone 1 (coastal waters) and Zone 2 (Willamette and Hood river watersheds). The opening will be May 3 in all other zones except that Lake county will have a May 20 opening. The trout season closing date, October 12, is uniform for the entire state.

Cascade Lakes

Nearly all Cascade Mountain lakes within national forest boundaries have a May 30 opening and September 30 closing date. General bag and possession limits are the same as last year's. The special 14 inch maximum length limit on the McKenzie river is out.

A highlight in the tentative regulations is a special salmon bag limit on the Columbia river. To obtain uniformity on salmon angling in the Columbia river with Washington, the Oregon game commission tentatively adopted the following regulation: "On the Columbia river exclusive of its tributaries between July 1 and October 12, the daily salmon bag limit is 2 fish over 24 inches and 4 between 12 and 24 inches. The possession limit or weekly limit is 4 fish over 24 inches and 8 between 12 and 24 inches."

Punch Card

In place of the salmon tag card a punch card similar to that required of steelhead fishermen in Washington is slated. The punch card would eliminate affixing a tag to each salmon or steelhead taken over 20 inches. A regulation specifying the use of artificial lures only on Diamond lake is eliminated in the tentative regulations.

Fly Fishing

A portion of the North Umpqua river from the confluence of Rock creek upstream to Soda Springs dam site, including tributaries to that section, exclusive of lakes, is set aside for fly fishing only, in the tentative regulations. The commission decided a fly fishing only regulation for this 33 mile section of spawning area would afford protection to spring chinook and summer steelhead, both at critically low levels in the Umpqua river, while still allowing recreation through fly fishing. The alternative faced by the commission was a total closure of this section.

Heating January 25

Following a two-week interval the commission will hold another public hearing Friday, January 25 beginning at 10 a.m. at its Portland headquarters on S. W. 16th and Alder streets. After the hearing the commission will make any changes it deems necessary and set the final regulations.

Beavers Take Trip To Inland Empire For 4-Game Series

Oregon State College, Corvallis—After dropping three out of its first four conference starts at home, Oregon State's inexperienced young basketball team takes the road Thursday, January 17, on the rugged four-games-in-five-days jaunt to the Inland Empire.

The Beavers open their road tour against highly regarded Idaho at Moscow Friday and Saturday and then swing over to nearby Pullman for a return series with Washington State next Monday and Tuesday. Coach Slats Gill and his men will leave for Moscow by chartered plane Thursday.

Idaho Looms Big

Idaho is always tough at home but looms rougher than usual this winter. The Vandals amazed the sports world by upsetting defending champion Washington on the Huskies' home floor, 56-51, in the league opener. The Beavers and Cougars split their initial series with OSC winning the opener, 53-45, but dropping the second affair, 54-44. Washington State trounced Idaho, 62-46, last Saturday at Pullman.

The Beavers dropped two hard-fought decisions to Washington, 46-37 and 49-41, here last week end. Gill's men were in both battles until the final gun but the Huskies packed too much experience and shooting ability for the young Orange.

Bob Edwards, veteran 6-6 Beaver center who sprained his ankle in the first Washington encounter and missed Saturday's game, is on the doubtful list for the Idaho series this week end. Loss of his height hurt the Orange considerably.

Although he managed to collect only 12 points in the Washington series, Forward Jim Padgett continues to lead the Beavers in scoring for conference games with 35 while Guard Danny Johnston is far ahead in point making for all games with 125.

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CG High to Hear Wildlife Program

A wildlife management assembly program will be presented to Cottage Grove high school students Friday, January 25, by Game Commission Education Agent Austin Hamer.

The program, prepared by the game commission's information-education division, is being presented in high schools throughout Oregon and it is designed to acquaint teen-agers with basic game management principles and economic and recreational values of wildlife.

Following Hamer's illustrated talk, a movie entitled "A Heritage We Guard" will be shown. Schools receiving this program last year are slated for another which deals with big game animals—deer, elk, and antelope.

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
