Inventory is over and the January sales are on in your stores, while spring takes a spur of the moment backseat. But predictions are still in store, trends being forecast with a pretty picture in view for sunnier skies.

What are the trends for the coming season? White details that always betray the time of year—big white round collars, cuffs. Also new are the 3/4 or short sleeves in coats, rollback sleeves with wide cuffs. Can be turned down if cold winds blow. The coats themselves, short with a tapered look, or long with a wrapped or fitted look. The fitted ones often have wide, flaring skirts.

In suits, the nipped-in waist effect often teamed with full skirt, falling gently in folds or pleated all around. Suits also feature the 3/4 sleeve, some cuffed or slim and uncuffed. Often shown in pincheck wool or slubbed wool and silk.

Jackets often are lined in printed rayon or silk.

Drop shoulder effect is seen in suits as well as dresses.

Summer dresses this year will mean fewer headaches with creases and the "mussed-up" look. Crease-resistant fabrics made possible through chemistry are a real boon, especially to the working girl. Among those to be seen are gay embossed or everglazed cottons, print silks and rayons, bright plaids, nifty or bumpy wools, glazed denims, print linens made more interesting, stripes appearing in new places, on organza; polka dots in many fabrics, nice in butcher linen.

Summer dresses are more and more feminine. Full bouffant skirts, the baby look in the blouse, with tiny collar and tiny front buttons, full 3/4 sleeves. Or sleeveless linen, with open work detail down the front. Or billowy silk or shantung, tailored top. Or the lovely suit dress, in silk or rayon print, with double breasted jacket, velvet collar, and full pleated skirt.

Bright cottons for resort wear, with bare halter tops, bolero jackets in contrasting plain colors for the covered-up look. Polka dots in suit dresses, long or bolero jackets, wide white collars. Short Indian print full jackets nice over a bathing suit, shorts, or with a white linen skirt. Resort whites with bare tops in organdie shantung, pique, or in linen. Sleeveless coats are making a debut.

The color story—charcoal and white, taking the place of traditional black. Navy, good as ever. Red, outstanding in all kinds of Indian prints, paired with yellow, bright blue and green. Blues, all shades from baby colors to turquoise and a shocking blue. Corals, so pretty in the sun. White, nice in jersey, or blond, the next thing to white. Lavender, shocking pink.
