## World Faith Meet Scheduled at Ore.

University of Oregon, Eugene, (Special)—Eight distinguished religious leaders will be guest speakers at the Parliament of World Religions scheduled for the University of Oregon January 20 through 24. They will discuss the leading religions of the world during the five-day meeting.

Representing the Hindu religion will be Swami Devatmananda, head of the Vedanta Center in Portland. He will present a series of talks on Hinduism during the meeting and will speak at a university assembly on Tuesday, January 22.

**Moslems To Speak**  
Bashir Ahmad Minto, president of the Moslem Society of the United States, Inc., will present the theology of Islam. Mr. Minto has been working as a preacher of Islam in this country since 1947.

Presenting the theology of Judaism at the meeting will be Rabbi Julius Josef Nodel of the Temple Beth Israel in Portland. Rabbi Nodel is also Hillel counselor at the university.

Henry S. Tatsumi, associate professor on the staff at the University of Washington, will present talks on Buddhism, Confucianism and Taoism.

Three major divisions of Christianity will be covered by speakers from each. The Very Rev. Georges Florovsky, official representative of the Ecumenical Patriarchate (Eastern Orthodox Church) of Constantinople, will present the doctrine of his church. Since his arrival in the United States in 1948, he has served as professor of divinity at St. Vladimir's Seminary in New York and as a teacher at Union Theological Seminary and Columbia university.

**Priest Scheduled**  
The Rev. Martin Thielens, superintendent of Catholic schools in western Oregon, will discuss the Roman Catholic Church. Father Thielens is also a member of the Matrimonial Court and of the Building Commission of the Archdiocese of Portland in Oregon.

The Protestant doctrine will be represented by the Rev. Dr. Gerald Kennedy, bishop of the Methodist Church in the Portland area. Bishop Kennedy has an outstanding religious and educational career and is the author of numerous books and articles.

The Rev. Dr. Paul S. Wright will open the Parliament with an address entitled "A Parliament of World Religions." Dr. Wright is the pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Portland.

Sessions of the Parliament will be open to both students and the public.

## GOOD HEALTH



### Answer to Question No. 1:

1. Measles is a virus disease which usually is spread by coughing or sneezing—before the skin eruptions appear and have indicated the nature of the ailment. Direct contact with a person who is coming down with measles is the usual mode of transmission. Between exposure and first symptoms, a week to ten days will elapse.

### Answer to Question No. 2:

2. More women than men receive dental treatment in the United States each year. Fourteen women visit the dentist for every ten men. A total of 60,000,000 persons in the nation re-

ceived some type of dental treatment during 1949.

### Answer to Question No. 3:

3. Fewer child patients are hospitalized today for several reasons: they are protected from disease by preventive measures such as immunization, well-balanced diets, better sanitation and improved health knowledge on the part of their parents. With infants there is much less incidence of intestinal disorders because of improved knowledge of diet. The use of sulfonamides and antibiotics in the early stages of disease has also reduced the need for child hospital beds.
