SGT. ROBERT HANKINS PROMOTED TO SERGEANT 1ST CLASS IN GERMANY

Boblingen, Germany—Sgt. Robert K. Hankins, currently serving with a psychological warfare unit in southern Germany, received promotion to sergeant first class recently. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Glen O. Hankins, Cottage Grove.

Hankins' unit, the 5th Loudspeaker and Leaflet Co., recently participated in the 160,000-man "Combine" maneuver, largest allied field exercise since the war. The 5th, which is designed to provide combat propaganda support to line infantry outfits, was commanded by Lt. Gen. Manton S. Eddy, Seventh Army commanding general.

Hankins was a member of the first draft contingent to leave Oregon following the Korean outbreak. He entered the army August 30, 1950 and took basic training at Fort Ord, Calif.

He was assigned in November to the 2nd Loudspeaker and Leaflet Co., at Fort Riley, Kan., and was transferred in June of this year to the 5th. His company arrived in Europe early in September.

Hankins graduated from the University of Oregon in 1950.

Wayne Underwood, son of Mrs. Pearl Underwood of Cottage Grove, has enlisted in the air corps and is now at Lackland Air Base, Texas for training. He is a 1951 graduate of Union high school.

Device Patented To Set Back Fires

A patent pending since 1947, has been granted A. B. Everts, Portland, for his "device for setting and controlling backfires". Everts is an equipment engineer of the U. S. Forest Service.

The device, a unit designed for pulling behind a truck or other vehicle, is capable of setting and extinguishing backfires at rates of speed up to 8 miles per hour in light fuels. Backfires often are started to burn out the vegetation in front of an uncontrolled fire. When the fire reaches the burned out area, it dies for lack of fuel. The federal government has free use of Evert's invention.

One part of the fire-fighting unit sets the backfire. It resembles a flamethrower. The other important component consists of a series of nozzles through which water is sprayed to put out the fire on the outside of the line. The backfire then eats back into the path of the main fire.

Willamette Forest Heads Revenue List

Total receipts of \$19,504.15 have been reported by 19 national forests in Oregon and Washington for the first half of fiscal year 1952, which began July 1. This sum is more than 50 percent higher than for the same period in the previous fiscal year, indicating that another record year is in the making.

Timber sales provide most of these receipts with the balance collected from grazing fees, land use permits, water power rights, and minor miscellaneous sources.

Willamette Tops

The Willamette national forest with headquarters in Eugene, Oregon, collected \$3,340,015.57 during the period July 1 to December 31, 1951, to lead other forests in the region. Second highest receipts of \$2,126,972.07 were turned in by the Olympic forest, Olympia, Wash., and third highest, \$1,483,092.85 by the Umpqua forest, Roseburg, Oregon.

OPS has issued Ceiling Price Regulation 95 setting the ceiling price in dollars and cents by region, model and year of all standard makes of used cars. The specific ceilings for used cars are the maximum that buyers pay. However, used car dealers may sell below the ceiling. New automobile dealers, furthermore, may allow more than the used ceiling prices in allowances on new cars, which are also under ceiling prices.

him walk around on his front legs, as he is more of an oddity that way than if he walked on four."

Mrs. Bush said that so many curiosity seekers had come to see the pig that she probably would get nothing done but showing off the animal.
