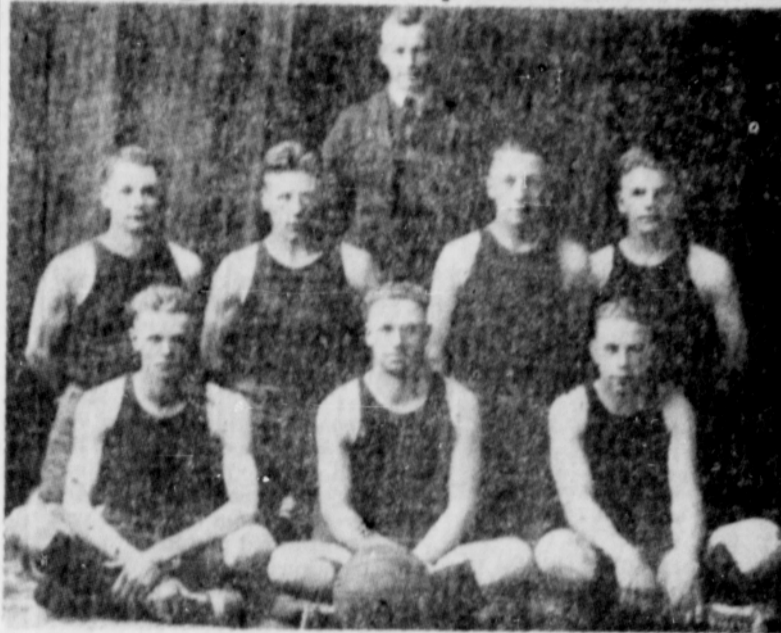

Way Back When

Back in 1922 Cottage Grove's basketball teams were beginning to show marked improvement, winning five out of eleven games. As usual the games weren't written up too well, only a brief mention being given of the games besides giving the score.

Here are three games played on February 10, 11 and 15, 1922.

In the close and interesting game between the basketball teams of the University of Oregon high school and Cottage Grove high school, played Saturday night in the local Y.M. hall, the visitors were winners by five points, the final score being 25-20. The Cottage Grove boys held the lead throughout the game, but the local shooters crowded them in the last few minutes of play. Morelock was the star of the contest, garnering 11 of the total 25 counting chalked up by the visiting team.

Albany was taken into camp Friday night by the high school boys' basketball team, the score being 24-20. In the first half Albany had the long end of an 11-5 score. At the end of the last half the score was tied, 18-18, the locals winning in the extra play.

Skilling and Hinkle starred for the locals, Skilling playing himself almost sick. The Cottage Grove lineup was Morelock and Hubbell forwards; Hinkle, center; Skilling and Cochran, guards.

The high school basketball team was defeated here Wednesday night by the Medford organization, the score being 31-22. Skilling

again played a star game for the locals, whose lineup was weakened by the illness of two of their veterans.

Other scores for the season were CG-21 Monroe 16; CG-30, 34 Pleasant Hill-16, 24; CG-8 Roseburg-41; CG-18, 24 Albany-34-20; CG-25, 25 Uni High-20-27; CG-22, 15 Eugene 34, 48; CG-20 Medford 31.

Accesses Arranged To Fish Reservoir

State Game Director P. W. Schneider has announced that public access for fishing at Malheur reservoir between Burns and Vale will be provided through the game commission's first expenditure of federal aid for fish restoration funds.

Next trout season anglers will have access to Malheur reservoir on a road provided through an easement obtained with the federal aid funds.

Information on restrictions to public fishing on the Rogue, Nestucca and Deschutes rivers and Unity and Higgins reservoirs in northeastern Oregon is now being compiled. This game commission program of providing fishing access through easements and acquisitions is termed a long-range operation designed to meet a rapidly growing problem.

The 10 percent federal excise tax on fishing tackle, under provisions of the recent Dingell-Johnson act, is divided among the states on the basis of angling license holders and size.

Last November the game commission voted to use Oregon's share of federal sport fishery aid funds for providing public access to fishing waters. The commission's share in matching funds is 25 percent of the project cost.

Malheur reservoir was poisoned in 1950 by commission fishery agents to destroy trash fish and last summer 176,000 advanced fry and fingerling rainbow trout were liberated in the reservoir. On November 1, Fishery Agent Allan Lichens of Hines checked growth rates on 217 rainbow freed in the reservoir and found they already averaged 6.7 inches in length. At this rate of growth the trout should provide excellent angling for the 1952 trout season.

To complete its part of the reservoir access agreement the game commission will build a permanent cattle guard on the Carrol Locey property and a 1-acre parking area at the reservoir edge controlled by the Orchard water company.

Admission to school athletic events and school fairs held in the school's own facilities have been exempted by OPS from ceiling price regulation.

Lion Cagers Top St. Francis 45-32

Paced by Wes Malcolm's second half scoring spree of 14 points, the Cottage Grove Lions thundered by a 15-16 halftime deficit and went on to defeat the St. Francis five 45-32.

St. Francis leaped ahead after the tipoff and led 5-1 before the Lion offense could get clicking. The quarter ended 9-8 for St. Francis. From here on out to halftime was the only time the game was very tight, the score being tied at 13-13 in the middle of the second quarter and 16-15 for St. Francis at halftime.

Isley's bucket and free throw as the second half got underway gave the Lions a lead which they never lost.

Grove's lead steadily increased, leaving the third quarter score at 34-25 for Cottage Grove. Grove's offense seemingly never faltered once as the nine point lead changed to a thirteen point lead as the game ended despite the sharp eye of Bartholomew who was potting long ones from all over the court.

Besides working the ball around better, the Grovers were hitting better than they did in the Eugene game.

Despite only 15 points in the first half, most of which were free throws, Cottage Grove racked up a total of 45 points. Most of St. Francis' points were from long pot shots over the heads of the Grove guards.
