Burma's quota in the Fund is \$15,000,000 and its subscription to the capital stock of the Bank is 150 shares with a total par value of \$15,000,000.

The high cost of giving will not be fully realized until all the January bills are paid.

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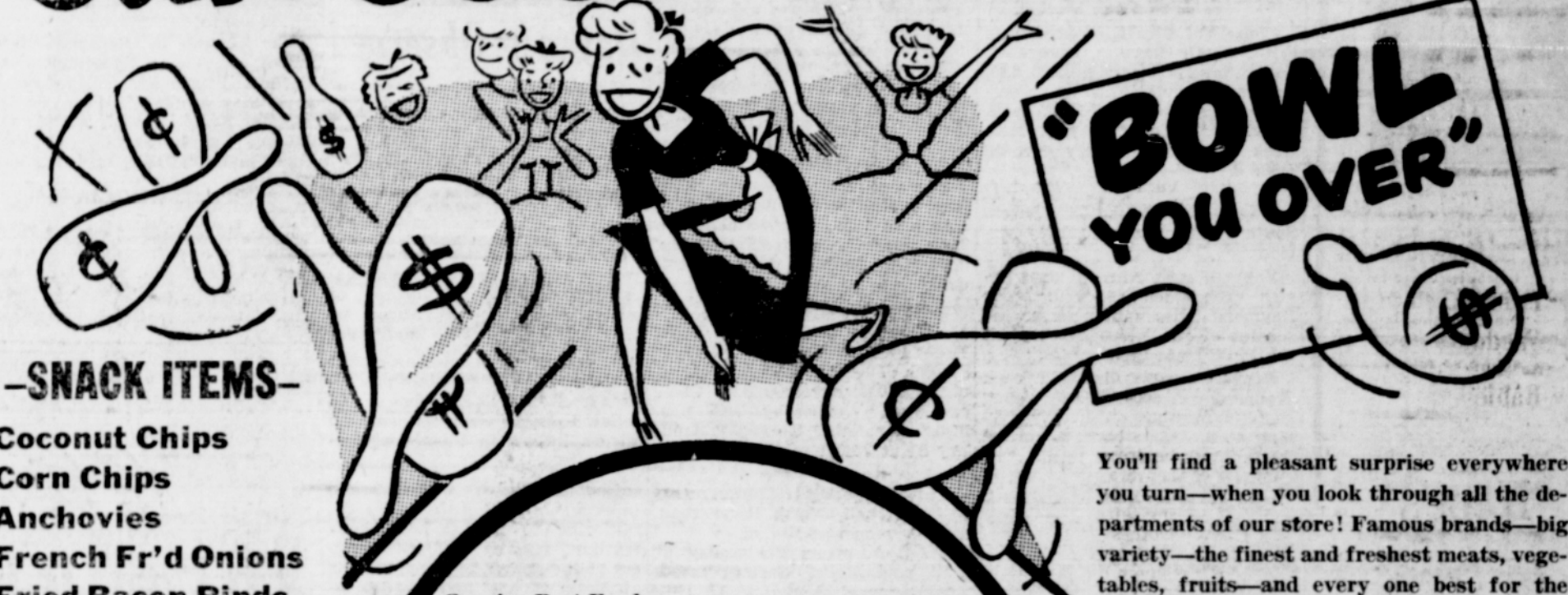
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
