The breakfast was served by the Catholic ladies of the Drain area.

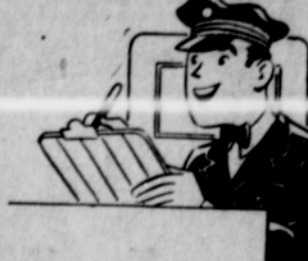

Co. Nurse Speaks To Baxter Group

Mrs. Elizabeth Bullington, county nurse for this area, spoke to the Methodist church Maxter Fellowship group Sunday night on her work, especially in school health.

Mrs. Bullington, who herself is a mother and takes active part in PTA work as head of the welfare committee, told of her visits to homes referred to her by the school or physicians. She also checks children in 22 schools from the Creswell area to the county border.

She told of eye tests and audiometer tests for hearing given to school children. In the area of communicable diseases, she said, principals were required by law to send all children home whom they might even suspect of being ill. Slips are sent home to be signed by the physician.

Mrs. Bullington told of child guidance clinics for emotionally maladjusted children held twice a year in Eugene. Also of the crippled children's clinic held four times a year in Eugene. She also mentioned the health clinics held once a month locally for shots and general checkups.

A total of 12 cars can be serviced at one time. Just outside between the office and the repair shop, is a covered parking area where cars may be put while awaiting servicing.

Radiant Heat
Radiant heat and insulation are also features that make comfortable working conditions.

As for details—in the repair shop all the most modern equipment is installed. Lubrication machines are operated by air. Three twinpost hoists in the floor raise either ends of the car or the entire vehicle. Individually operated lift doors are a feature. Wooden beams size 6 x 18 and from 36 to 42 feet long painted a rich, dark brown support the repair shop ceiling. They hang over on the outside to form a breezeway or passageway along the front.

A modern restroom with lockers is provided for employees in the repair shop. Public restrooms have outside front entrances.

Rustic Paneling
A most attractive feature as you view the building from the outside is the natural dark wood panel like finish, rustic in appearance. Brown and shades of green is the color scheme carried throughout the entire building.

In the offices are the most modern oak desks. New streamlined phones have been installed with a large place for the dial to be set in when the dial system is installed in the city.

Another attractive feature is the slanted open boards that decorate the top part of the room between the parts department and offices and the receiving and shipping room. The wood is painted brown.

Mahogany Sidewall

In the showroom is an accessory case of glass against a lovely background of mahogany sidewalls. The lighting fixtures here are modern and scroll like in design with a central bulb that is encased in silver. Fluorescent tubes, many in orange crate casings, decorate the entire building. And in the showroom on the east wall just below the casing is a panel

of cove lights, fluorescent tubing. In the center of the floor are four electric outlets that can be used for a turntable to display cars. The asphalt tile floor is green and tan speckled squares. The sheetrock insulated ceiling of pressed excelsior and cement, left in its natural look, is especially noticeable in the showroom. It forms a speckled, tan appearance and looks inset between rows of small squared beams painted an off-white color.

J. S. Crepeau of Cottage Grove was the contractor. Nelson Electric installed the fixtures. Al Thomas did the roofing. Other local firms that aided in the work were R. L. Woods Construction, Zumwalt & Williams, Pass Creek Paving and R. C. Oster.

John Stafford of Eugene was the architect.
