Atomic Exhibit Set for U of O

University of Oregon, Eugene (Special)—An Atomic Energy Exhibit, considered to be the nation's most complete atomic energy display, will be shown on the University campus in Eugene for three days, starting January 29.

The show, brought direct from the AEC's Oak Ridge Laboratories, has been planned to give the layman an understanding of nuclear energy and its place in the world of today and tomorrow. Origin of the energy, how it was harnessed, and the practical good that might come of it are explained in the exhibits. Included is a section on civil defense.

To Be Demonstrated
Sponsors of the Eugene show are the University of Oregon and the General Extension Division of the state system of higher education. It will be shown in the Erb Memorial Union on the campus and will be demonstrated by students.

The exhibit is shown in a guided 14 hour tour. No charge is made for the exhibit. School groups are particularly urged to take advantage of the opportunity to view the display which is directed particularly toward the high school level and adults. Eugene hours are 1 p.m. to 9 p.m. daily, except Jan. 31, when the show opens at 9 a.m. and closes at 5 p.m.

Four Show Centers
Eugene is one of the four centers in the state where the display will be shown. It will open in Medford on January 24 through 26; Eugene, January 29 through 31; Corvallis, February 4 through 6; and Portland, February 9 through 12.

Forest Chief's Annual Report: Need Ways to Fight Insects, Disease; Sets Solution to Mine Claim Problem

Watts in his annual report also stated that hundreds of new mining claims were filed on national forest land throughout the country last year, adding to the management problem created by some two million acres presently covered by mining claims.

Many of these claims, which make effective land management impossible in numerous areas, are believed to have been located for other purposes than mining, such as summer home sites, rights to valuable timber, and control of access routes to large tracts of public timber, the report added.

Gives Solutions
The chief of the Forest Service presents two possible solutions to the mining claim problem which would enable legitimate miners to prospect for and develop needed mineral resources and enable the Forest Service to manage the non-mineral resources of the national forests for the interests of all. These solutions are: (1) separation of surface and mineral rights, or (2) leasing of lands for minerals.

CAN BE FATAL

Remember this is the age of high pressure and high speed. Let's not catch the fever—it can be fatal.

The need for more progress in protecting the nation's forests against insects and diseases was noted this week by Lyle F. Watts, U. S. Forest Service chief. In his annual report to the Secretary of Agriculture, Watts stated that millions of board feet of timber needed for defense, housing, industry, and home use are lost each year to insects and disease.

Greater Than Fire

Greater loss of timber results from insects and disease than from fire. During the 10-year period 1934-43, losses from fire averaged 460 million cubic feet of timber a year. During the same period, about 622 million cubic feet were lost to insects and disease, it is estimated.

In 1951, national forests returned to the U. S. Treasury \$1,194,000 more than the total cost of their protection and management, and are contributing increasingly to the nation's supply of forest products. During the year, approximately 4,688 million board feet of timber were cut from them, the highest cut in the history of the Forest Service. Annual timber production from the national forests could be stepped up about 50 percent if access roads were built into areas now inaccessible.

Subject to Ills

"Like mankind, the trees of the forest are subject to many ills," the chief forester stated in the report. Various fungi and bacteria produce rusts, wilts, blights, and rots. Destructive forest insects include the spruce budworm, tussock moth, larch sawfly, tent caterpillar, gypsy moth, and the Engelmann spruce beetle.

Here in the Pacific Northwest, a total of 2,129,000 acres of Douglas-fir timberland has been sprayed from the air in the battle against the spruce budworm, all in the past three years. Federal and state agencies and private landowners have combined money and personnel in the continuing fight to save valuable timber. In 1951, about 928,000 acres were sprayed with a budworm kill of over 95 percent. Cost of the project averaged close to \$1.10 per acre.

Plan Spraying

Planned for 1952 is the spraying of 640,000 acres of infested forest land in Oregon and Washington. Spraying is confined to areas of good timber which are so heavily infested that extensive tree killing is imminent and to infestations which threaten areas already sprayed.

Senator Jack Lynch Tosses Hat In Ring For State Treasurer



Portland—State Senator Jack Lynch today tossed his hat in the ring as a candidate for the Republican nomination for state treasurer of Oregon at the primary election on May 16.

Senator Lynch presents an impressive record of accomplishments in fields that have close association with the responsibilities of a state treasurer, particularly in the functions of that official as a member of the state board of control.

In Senate

Lynch served as state senator from Multnomah county during the 1943-47-49 and 1951 sessions. He has been chairman of the committees on state affairs, public health and game and has served on the following important committees: public buildings and institutions, rules and bills, revision of laws, commerce and navigation, federal relations, county affairs, insurance, military affairs, elections and commerce and utilities.

These legislative capacities have given him an understanding of state fiscal, institutional, public health, commerce and natural resource conservation problems.

Policy Statement

In a prepared statement of policy, Senator Lynch states: "Aside from the state treasurer's important duties as custodian of all state funds and securities belonging to the various trust funds of the state, excepting those of the state land board, and aside from his duties as a member of the land board, banking board, bond commission, reclamation and other boards and commissions, he is a member of the important board of control."

Norblad Announces For Re-election To U. S. Congress

Rep. Walter Norblad of the First Oregon Congressional District this week announced his candidacy for reelection. Norblad, a 43-year old Astoria lawyer, who was first elected to Congress shortly after his discharge from the Army in 1945, is completing his fourth consecutive term in the House. His current committee assignments include membership on the powerful Committee on Committees and Armed Services, and the position of Western Republican Whip.

S. Unander Resigns Central Committee To Run for Office

Portland—Sigfrid B. Unander has submitted his resignation as chairman of the Republican State Central Committee "to take part in the other side of political activity and become a candidate for high public office."

Unander, who has held the chairmanship for three years, announced his resignation in a letter this week to Republican leaders throughout the state. He did not state what public office he will seek, but persistent reports have him running for state treasurer.
