## Slip Cover Workshop to be held For Homemakers in Extension Units

Do the chairs in your home have slip covers that fit like a glove? This will not be just a dream for the 235 homemakers in the home extension units throughout Lane county signed up for the slip cover workshops to be held in their respective communities in February and March.

Each of the homemakers will first attend an all day meeting in their community where they will repair the innerspring cushions from the chair to be slip covered. Tangled springs can cause loose cushions to become lumpy. The re-novating process is quite simple. Usually old springs and cotton padding can be used again. Unbleached muslin will be used to make the new pockets to encase the springs. With the old cover replaced the cushion looks and sits as well as new.

Then the 235 participating homemakers bring the chair to be slip covered and attend a preliminary meeting held in Eugene in February. At this time they will receive instruction on how to measure to determine the required amount of material for the slip cover. It is urged that the homemakers concerned do not buy their material before this meeting. Suitable materials will be displayed and discussed. Those attending will learn which supplies are needed and will make specific plans for their community workshops.

The homemakers (four from each community participating) who are to be project leaders and conduct the workshop in their community, attend a three day training workshop in March and slip cover a chair as a practice project in the learning process. Three areas in the county will be points of training: Mapleton area for coast units, Eugene area for part of the valley, and Goshen area for the south end of the valley. Constance Blaine and Virginia Carlson, Lane county home extension agents, will conduct this training workshop.

These project leaders return and conduct a similar workshop for the interested group who had signed up in their home extension units.

The extension agents urge that it is necessary to bring only chairs with simple lines of construction to permit the workshop to be completed in the three days allotted.

Today, slip covers are carefully fitted and smartly tailored. Well considered choice of material as

to color, texture and pattern can mean an attractive slip cover that becomes an important part of your home furnishings. They can be used to a great advantage to protect new pieces of furniture, especially where there are small children. Or attractive slip covers often cover worn or faded upholstery and add color and new life to a room.

Are you aware that extension's monthly meetings are open to you if you are not now a member of one of the 31 extension units in Lane county? If you are interested in knowing where the closest unit meets, call the home extension office, 4-2219 in Eugene.

The following topics are to be covered in extension meetings to be held from January through May: "Canada," "Remodeling Garments," "Meal Planning," "Simple Home Repairs," and "Dry Cleaning." And a special meeting will be held on "Outdoor Fireplaces."

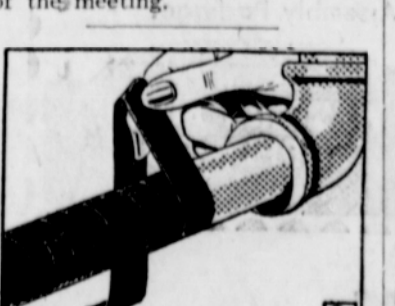

## Bradley-OSC Meet In 2-Game Series

Oregon State College, Corvallis. —Bradley university, one of the ranking powers in collegiate basketball over the past year, will invade the Pacific Northwest for the first time this week end for a two-game series with Oregon State's youthful Beavers.

The Braves from Peoria, Ill., meet Coach Slat's Gill's men in the P-I pavilion in Portland Friday night, then move into Gill Coliseum in Corvallis for the Saturday night feature event of a Dad's Day program on the campus.

Bradley has a natural reason for meeting the Beavers this season. The Braves will remember the humiliating 75-45 defeat administered them by the Orange-men in the finals of the Hawaiian Invitational tourney in Honolulu last March, after Bradley had edged OSC 77-74 in a pre-season contest.

Coach Fordy Anderson, 32-year-old Bradley mentor, guided his club to a 32-6 record in 1951 and in three years at the helm boasts a mark of 91 victories against only 19 losses. Twice Bradley was runner-up for the national college crown and just last winter the Braves were ranked second in the national poll.

**Beavers in Cellar** The Beavers, depending largely on the work of five freshmen, currently are lodged in the northern division cellar—a spot unfamiliar to Oregon State fans. Gill hopes the non-conference tiffs against the Braves might snap the Beavers out of a pointmaking slump picked up on the Inland Empire invasion last week.

Only Orangemen regarded as sure starters for the series are Junior Danny Johnston and Freshman Bill Toole. Johnston has been the squad's leading scorer and can operate from either a forward or guard position and Toole is rated the fastest basketballer in the northern division.

Another good bet to start is Freshman Center Tex Whiteman. The 6-6 Rook from Colorado has improved with each contest and looked particularly good against WSC. Still battling for the other two positions are Letterman Jim Padgett, Jim Nau and Jack Orr, plus Sophomores Dick Brust and Ted Romanoff and Freshmen Ron Robins and Reggie Halligan.

**Bradley Lineup** Bradley probably will open with a lineup composed of Harvey Babetch and John Riley, forwards; Dick Goelzer, center; and Bob Carney and LeRoy Ott, guards.

There will be a Friday night preliminary in Portland between the OSC JV's and the Portland Air Base, starting at 6:30. No Preliminary is scheduled here Saturday, with the varsity contest starting at 8 p.m.

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Cherry Pie Champ Enters State Meet

Cottage Grove high school's champion cherry pie maker—Mary Woodworth—will take her culinary talents to Roosevelt Junior high school Saturday, February 2, where she will compete in a state contest.

Mary, a sophomore and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George P. Woodworth of Mosby Creek, won the local contest in a playoff held last Wednesday. She and Judy Hodges had tied for first place. The contest is sponsored by the National Red Cherry Institute. State winner will enter a national contest.

The winning pie maker has been in 4-H club work for several years and has won ribbons in cooking, sewing and livestock. She is a member of the Row River Hustlers, 4-H club guided by her father, George Woodworth and Mrs. Ethel Seaver.

Recipe for her winning pie is as follows: Two-crust cherry pie: ½ cup sifted flour ½ cup shortening ¼ t salt 4 to 5 T water Mix crust in usual manner. Roll out half of crust.

Filling: 2½ cups water pack cherries 1 cup sugar ½ t tapioca ½ t salt 1 cup liquid juice from cherries ¼ t almond extract. Mix sugar, tapioca, salt, extract, liquid and cherries. Stir and let stand about 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Put mixture in crust in pie tin, put on top and bake at 450° first 10 minutes and 350° 35 to 45 minutes.
