Escaped Prisoner Re-serving Time

This is what might be called a case of delayed justice. A man who escaped from Cottage Grove police custody almost two years ago is back serving an unexpired term of 74 days in city jail.

Waymon J. Graves, 33, of 150 Blair Blvd., Eugene, was arrested there last Wednesday night by Police Chief Ed Jones and started re-serving the sentence right away.

The man was painting yellow street stripes on the first day of a 75-day sentence for driving under the influence of alcohol in August, 1950, when he walked off the job, Jones said. He was serving the sentence because he was unable to pay the \$150 fine levied.

He was re-arrested on a tip from Eugene police.

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Dr. W. Nicholson Gives Impressions Of European Visit

Dr. Wesley Nicholson, minister of the First Congregational church of Eugene, guest speaker at the luncheon program of the Cottage Grove Lions club last Thursday noon, told of some impressions gathered while visiting eight European nations the past summer.

He was one of the American representatives of the Congregational church at the session of the World Council of Churches. He said there was only one representative from the churches of the iron curtain nations and that this representative later dropped out. Discussing the situation in China, he said the communist authorities issued what they called a Christian manifesto, which called for all ties with the west to be severed. The majority of Christians in China subscribed to the communist manifesto for various reasons, he said. He had one Christian friend in China, whom he did not communicate with, because any kind of communication might put him under suspicion.

In referring to some of the nations visited, Dr. Nicholson said Italy was in bad shape, France was unstable, Switzerland was the garden spot of Europe and England was upset. The average European looks with disfavor on the American tourist, because he thinks the pocket of the tourist is bulging with money, he added.

The best way to be an ambassador of goodwill is to associate with the citizens of the countries visited, eat and sleep in the hotels, instead of going to some place reserved exclusively for the American visitor, he said.

Following the talk of Dr. Nicholson, Otto Adolph of Dallas, district governor of Lions 36-R district, made a short talk. He was en route home from the Dexter-Lowell area, where a new club was chartered the previous evening. Nine new Lions clubs have been organized in this district. Mr. Adolph said he had quite a time in finding the golf club grounds and was successful after considerable effort.

The new method of artificial respiration will be demonstrated by Mrs. Ernest Darnell at the old Walden school house Monday evening, February 4, at the meeting of the First Aid class. The new method takes only a few minutes, Cross. Mrs. Darnell says this method takes only a few minutes, but is worth a great deal of time and effort to learn as its advantages far outweigh disadvantages over the old method. The time will be between 7:30 and 8 p.m.

Anyone in the Cottage Grove area who is interested and has a standard or other current First Aid card is welcome to attend.

Another demonstration will be given some time later in the spring, but no time or place has been set as yet.

The second adult upholstery class is being formed to start sometime within the next two weeks. Those interested in registering for the course may enroll by calling 774 and leaving their name, address and phone number with the high school office secretary. Classes are held all day Friday for four and one-half weeks.

Mrs. Mae Frye of Eugene will instruct the 27-hour course. As in the past classes are limited to a membership of 18 and those definitely interested should register right away.

Fee for the course is \$3.50. Exact time and meeting place for the class will be announced in next week's paper.

Classes are sponsored by Cottage Grove union high school in conjunction with the State Division of Vocational Education.

Youth Is Involved In Stealing Car

Two 16-year-old Dorena youths were released by juvenile authorities Tuesday after being arraigned in district court on a grand larceny charge. Trial for the one believed to have stolen a car will be set after further investigation.

The boys were arrested by police Sunday when they were found in a stolen car. One was released by authorities after being called merely a passenger in the car, not being with the other lad when the car was taken.

Chief of Police Ed Jones said that when the boys were arrested one of them admitted he stole the car containing about \$52 worth of articles. He told police he had driven it to Fresno, Calif., to visit his mother, returning about a week ago. Mrs. Nowak spotted the car as it was cruising around town Sunday, carrying both boys.

Police said the boy who admitted the theft told that he had been keeping the car since his return from California at Dorena, where he lived with his father. The articles, listed by the Nowaks as a spare tire, car jack, camera, rubber boots, etc. were missing. Jones said he believed they had been thrown out or gotten rid of in some way.

The juvenile passenger told police the other boy had informed him a brother had given him the car.
