

Refresher Courses For Air Reserves Open in 13 Fields

Eleven-day refresher courses in 10 technical fields for Air Force reserve officers and in three specialties for Reserve airmen will be available during the next few months. Reporting dates are Mar. 21, April 14 and 28, May 12 and 26, and June 9.

Officer courses are aerial photography, armament, budget and fiscal, classification and assignment, intelligence, photo interpreter, and state control, all at Lowry Air Force Base, Colo.; aircraft maintenance, Chanute AFB, Ill.; communications, Scott AFB, Ill.; and supply, Warren AFB, Wyo.

Courses for enlisted reserve airmen are: airplane and engine mechanic, Sheppard AFB, Tex.; armament technician, Lowry; and supply technician, Warren. Reservists interested in this training should apply through office having custody of their personnel records. Orders will allow time for travel in addition to 11 days.

UO Dads' Weekend Plans Being Made

University of Oregon, Eugene, (Special)—A successful Dad's Day Week end, February 2 and 3, is being anticipated by Chairman Pat Dignan, Gold Beach. RESERVE FIELD TRAINING

Individual and small unit training will be emphasized in the Army Organized Reserve Corps summer training program for 1952 under instructions issued by General Mark W. Clark, Chief of Army Field Forces.

In their second year of mandatory field training, the bulk of Army Reserve troop units will go into the field for 15-day periods between May 1 and September 15, 1952.

Mt. Rainier Ordnance Depot Helps Army Get Ultimate Dollar Value

TACOMA, Wash., January 25—Mount Rainier Ordnance Depot near here is playing a major part in helping the army get the ultimate value from every appropriated dollar. Officials at the depot, one of the army's major storage and repair plants, report that more than \$14,500,000 was saved in 1951, by reclamation of material and by cash sales.

While the major part of this sum came from the value of parts and materials that has been reconditioned and repaired and returned to army supply channels, actual cash sales of vehicles and parts no longer useable by the army amounted to \$254,212.56. An additional \$71,269.81 was realized from the sale of metal scrap.

Civil Defense Show Scheduled For Oregon

"Alert America," a traveling civil defense exhibit, will visit Oregon sometime this spring.

Jack Hayes, Oregon's director, in announcing the event said he saw the first showing of the exhibit while attending a meeting of state civil defense directors in Washington, D. C. He said "it represents the work of the nation's top artists and engineers, and does an excellent job of telling the civil defense story."

Alert America is sponsored by the Freedom Foundation, the same group that sponsored the Freedom Train. It is shipped by means of ten 32-foot trailers, and is set up in large auditoriums. Initially, it will visit 70 cities in the country, including Portland, of 23 states.

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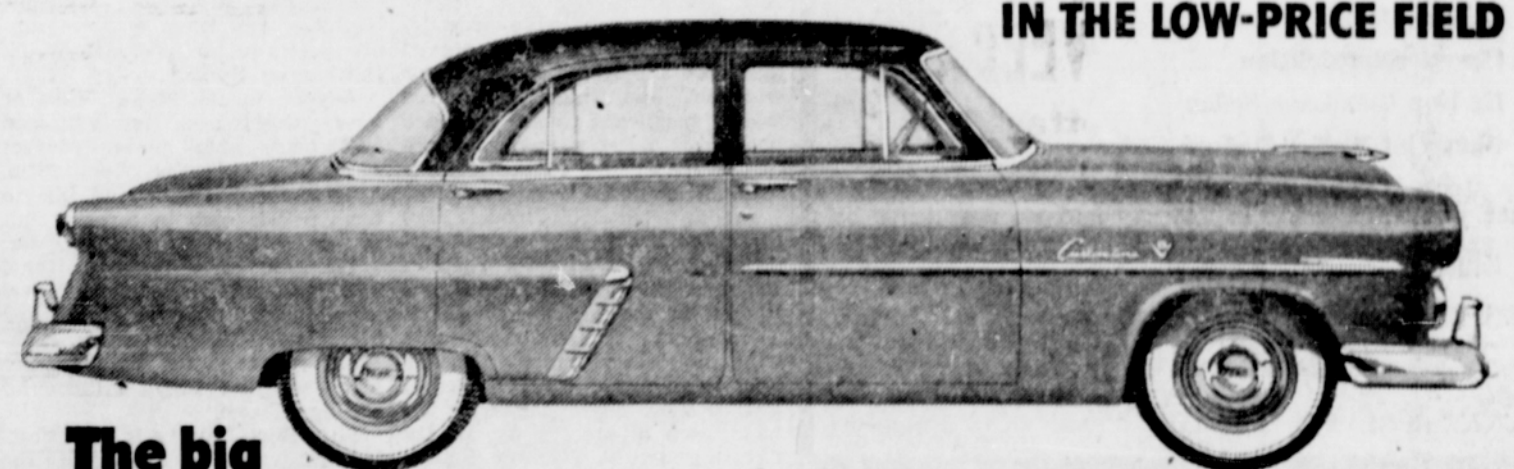

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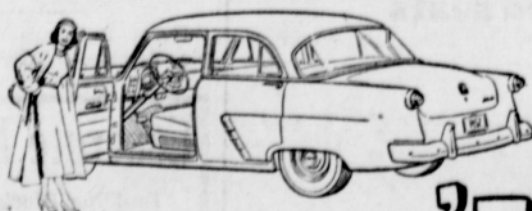
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
