

# Oregon Press Meet Set for Feb. 22-23

University of Oregon, Eugene. (Special)—A program full of timely subjects is scheduled for the 33rd annual Oregon Press conference to be held here February 22-23. Newspapermen throughout the state will attend the meeting sponsored by the school of journalism and the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association.

Three out-of-state speakers will be featured at the conference. James S. Pope, executive editor, Louisville (Ky.) Courier-Journal, will be the Eric W. Allen memorial lecturer. Brig. Gen. Robert A. McClue, chief of psychological warfare, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C., and Charley A. Broaded, director of industrial relations for Fisher Flouring Mills Company, Seattle, will also deliver major addresses.

Press conference President Ralph P. Stuller of the Coquille Valley Sentinel will preside at all business sessions. The conference will meet at the student union on campus Friday and will hold all sessions Saturday in the Eugene hotel.

A variation of interesting subjects will be discussed during the two-day conference: a former Marine Corps combat correspondent will give his impressions of the Korean war. There will be a panel discussion by journalism foreign students; and there will be discussions on labor news coverage, ethics and the law, economics, employee relations, and the teletypewriter.
