## Beavers Will Play Leading Huskies

Oregon State College, Corvallis, —It's back to northern division action this week for Oregon State's improving young Beavers who amazed the basketball world by scoring two straight victories over powerful Bradley university in an inter-sectional series last week end.

This week end Slat's Gill takes his Orange youngsters to Seattle for a return series against league leading Washington in Edmundson pavilion Friday and Saturday nights. The well-loaded Huskies trimmed the Beavers twice at Corvallis last month, 46-37 and 49-41, and will be heavily favored to repeat in Seattle.

Biggest topic of conversation among hoop fans in Corvallis right now is whether Gill's young club has really "arrived" or whether the northern division is just the toughest basketball league in the nation this winter and that the victories over Bradley don't mean a great deal as far as the ND is concerned.

Although the Orangemen managed to win only one out of seven starts in the first half of the northern division play, outside the conference they have posted impressive wins over California, currently leading the southern division of the PCC; Northwestern, one of the powers in the Big Ten race; and then two in a row over a Bradley club that had won seven straight and 12 of 18 before running into OSC.

Regardless, Gill's men looked much improved against Bradley.

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## Way Back When

Back in 1914 Cottage Grove had a pretty fair ball club, winning 6 out of 12 games. Three of the games weren't regular high school games. Le weren't played with other high schools.

Here are two writeups of Grove's 32-20 win over Corvallis and a 25-21 defeat by Dallas.

Cottage Grove high school was the victor in a rough game of basketball played against Corvallis high in the Armory Wednesday evening. The final score, 32-20 came as somewhat of a surprise both to the fans and the Corvallis team. The latter had proved themselves stronger than the local team in the first half by one basket. However, the home boys came back strong for a rough and fast second half, settled down into real team work and piled up the score rapidly, allowing their opponents only three baskets during the second period.

All of the home lads played a good, strong, steady game, making the picking of any particular stars difficult. Atkinson showed up well in the consistent manner in which he made good the fouls and startled the onlookers with several sensational baskets. Fullmer played a particularly steady game and both guards held their opponents down.

For Corvallis the work of Calvin at center was of a high order. The two teams clash again February 14 at Corvallis.

In a game at which the crowd became so enthusiastic that it might easily have been mistaken for a Roman mob, the Dallas high school team won from the local basketball tossers last Wednesday by a very close margin. The final score stood 25-21 with a protest registered by Cottage Grove on one basket.

It was a hard played game and showed the teams to be pretty evenly matched. Better luck at throwing fouls or making protests stick might have won the game for the home team.

Fullmer and Atkinson were the bright and shining lights for the local team and Matthews played an excellent defensive game, guarding an exceptionally clever forward.

The half ended giving the Grovers a slim 24-22 lead. Springfield dumped in 5 counters before CG could get rolling and by the middle of the third quarter the score stood 29-35. Grove cut down the Miller's lead with the quarter ending at 39-35 for Springfield.

The Vandals will open their Willamette Valley trip here this year and then move to Oregon State on Monday and Tuesday nights for the final pair of games. Coach Chuck Finley has one of his best teams in action this season and the Vandals will be favored to reverse the double defeat the Ducks handed them at McArthur Court last year.

**Upset Washington**  
Idaho opened its conference season with a startling upset of Washington and since that time has kept right in the contender's spot in the race for the division championship. This is the last road trip for the Vandals this season and they will return home to play both the Ducks and Washington a pair of games at Moscow later in the month.

Coach Finley's squad ranks as one of the tallest in recent league history and will outsize the Ducks by a considerable margin. Hartley Kruger, Sam Jenkins, Herb Millard, Dwight Morrison, Tom Flynn and Stu Dollinger have all shown scoring punch this season as the Vandals have demonstrated that they are on their way to a successful season.

**Split Games in '51**  
Last season the Ducks and the Vandals had a brilliant four game series with the Webfoots picking up two victories at Eugene, 60-56 and 62-56, and then splitting at Moscow, 63-66 and 47-46. Only two Ducks, Bob Peterson and Capt. Ken Hunt, who played prominent roles in Oregon's three wins last year will face the visitors this season.

One of the features of the game here will be the appearance of Gloria Ellexson, the internationally famous baton twirler. It will be the third appearance at the Igloo for the talented beauty and her act will again include fire batons and performances on skates.
