There is nothing that lifts the spirits like a spring bonnet—and they are in at your stores in all their lovely, breathless femininity. Frilly ones, some made all of flowers to go with that print dress, or more tailored ones, some in pastel felt, for your suit.

ARNEST'S has a nice selection—a navy straw sailor with red straw edging pinched like the crust of an apple pie, with two red straw pompons sticking up on navy stems for decoration. A black straw tam with white fluffy feather trim. Shiny crisscrossed beige straw cloche with green velvet band across the front, pinned with big round pearl buttons. Or pink shiny straw with tiny violet flowers, sits forward on the head.

For the tall, willowy figure, picture hats with wide brims—grey with black velvet polka dotted veil. Or lavender with wide purple velvet ribbon tied in a bow on the side where flowers are bunched. The flower cap in lavender, or pink with green leaves and pale green velvet ribbon interwoven in an out of the straw, both head hugging. Or pale pink fur felt with pink veil, sits forward over the forehead.

PETERSEN'S Easter hats are in, too. A pink flower cap, or a red shiny straw sailor. Blue and white check shiny straw pillbox. A yellow bonnet with pale yellow roses across the front and pale green veiling. Bright canary yellow hat with wide look sits back on the head, has row of tan flowers across the front of the turned back brim.

A lavender bonnet with pink flowers across the front, held tight by pale pink veiling. Small red straw cap, head hugging, decorated

ed at side with big clump of red flowers.

And navy, navy, navy—in all sizes and shapes. Many with red or white trim—calots, sailors and bonnets.

Here's more of what's new from head down for the pretty lady of spring, 1952—

At PERRY'S are the spring colored Chapter House short sleeved cardigan sweaters, with ribbed cross stitching a the top and little round collars. Colors, lavender and white.

Also new is the cable stitched sweater coat in red, white and navy with small metallic crown trim on the breast.

Lady Alice frocks are still arriving purer nylon shirtwaist style dresses with gently flaring skirts and small gold button trim on the blouse, in gold, light blue, red and navy.

Or a rayon linen dress with cardigan neckline and rhinestone button trim. For detail—vertical rows of stitching near the top. In gold and pink.

Slubbed rayon—Mary Dean two-piece dresses with flared skirt and waist trim trimmed in clear glass buttons. Nice now with long sleeved rayon skirt blouse.

For that slim look—a heavy butcher linen dress in plain brown or kelly, sleeveless with high rounded neck fastened by three shiny buttons over left shoulder. Tan bolero jackets with brown or kelly big polka dots.

For the half size women, Lady Alice has two piece rayon jerseys with velvet belt, peplum effect on blouse. In a grey with red ring print, or green with lavender.

For the junior—acetate rayon prints in pink with black dots, aqua with brown and chartreuse with navy. Round necks with low yoke and soft shirring. A real find for spring—Donnybrook coats. One in navy and white check with big rollback sleeves and round collar. Another in fireman's red with plain sleeves. Both full length.

Alice also has slubbed nylon sleeveless blouses in white, pink, navy and yellow with rhinestone buttons and stitched folds for trim down the front. Small square collars. Pair with shiny black Alice skirts accented pleated for fullness.

At THE SMART SHOP—Gay Gibson dress in heavy slubbed rayon, navy, with big covered buttons surrounded with tiny rhinestones. Buttons form V on front of blouse, skirt is gently flared.

New—Carol King now makes blouses, in cotton broadcloth, sleeveless, with scroll-like trim down front, shiny buttons—in grey, blue and pale green.

Also tailored shirts in blue, green or red and white check. A sweet Carole King dressy print—tan rayon background, dot-

ted with tiny black teams of horses drawing blue carriages. The low oval yoke is shirred down into the short sleeves. Full skirt with very low waistline.

California Colony Casuals come up with something different—the three piece camisole dress with detachable top and bolero. The skirt very full, bright red embossed cotton with wide self belt, buckle outlined in rhinestones. The camisole top zips up the side, has bone stiffening in strapless top. Rhinestones dot the collar, also the back of the bolero for cover-up.

Along the same line are very full white skirts of embossed cotton with camisole tops, big patch pockets in skirt outlined in red piping. Collar of top is also outlined in the red.

For Simple dressy occasions—A Gay Gibson taffeta, striped, in grey and pink, little round collar, diagonal covered button trim from collar to sleeve.

Martha Manning Petite for the woman 5'3" or under who is slim—in slubbed natural rayon, soft shirtwaist style.

Gay Gibson has a charming checked taffeta with old-fashioned look shiny jet black bottom trim. In pink or blue with black full skirt, modified shirtwaist top. Double collar caught back with the buttons.

Nothing like navy for spring, and Gay Gibson does it up attractively in a one piece linen weave rayon with shiny white buttons down the front. Collar, sleeves, pockets and front panel are outlined with a strip of the white linen.

And the princess of them all—Carol King's navy faille princess style unlined coat that can double as a dress with a swishy petticoat worn underneath. It has push up ¾ length sleeves, buttons down from the tiny collar with small shiny buttons.

Let's go square dancing from ARNEST'S. Just in are full square dancing skirts in navy, tan or lavender with three big rows of ruffles on the bottom trimmed with white cotton fringe. Or a gold cloth circle skirt in wine, blue and green flower print.

A nice skirt for spring is a Dan River cotton in tan with a tweedy look, soft pleats in front. T-shirt sets, grey striped, are in, and white terry cloth cardigan shirts.

Boulevard has a nice ribbed rayon suit for spring in blue, brown or green, with long belted jacket and cuffed sleeves, big pockets in the bottom of the jacket.

Johnnye Jr. has a real breath of spring in a nice broadcloth dress with white daisy trim dotting the skirt and under the buttons on the blouse. In red, orchid, burnt orange and charcoal.

A Johnnye Jr. rayon linen suit in good navy, with red and white collar trim, ¾ sleeve. Belted jacket, flared skirt. A good little summer suit.

A real beauty with the new look in coats—a shortie with roll back collar down to the hemline, the roll back a lovely rust color, as are the rollback sleeves. The coat itself is a natural with brown lines forming a large plaid.

Tiny waffle weave cottons in chartreuse, gold, lavender and dark green, tailored with V neck and big pockets.
