Billy Graham Takes Meetings To White House

The Billy Graham evangelist meetings the past three weeks which are being held on the east steps of the White House, Washington, D. C., have met with great success with over 4000 decisions for Christ.

The largest crowd ever to attend his meetings was Sunday when approximately 40,000 people gathered on the steps, in the streets and in nearby buildings to hear his message. Previous to Sunday he had spoken to more than 126,000 persons in his three weeks in Washington, D. C.

Overflow Crowd

His meetings have been carried on in the National Guard armory, Washington, D. C., with overflowing crowds nightly. He hopes to have his final meeting on February 17, again on the steps of the capitol.

Evangelist Billy Graham says sex and sin have reached such heights in the nation's capitol "we denounce these sins as a stench in the nostrils of God." He told the audience his source of information is the best selling book "Washington Confidential" and letters from broken homes. "Washingtonians should blush for their city," he declared. The evangelist derided modern authorities on sex, and said the Bible has the final answer to the problem. That answer, he said, "is hell for those who transgress the moral law."

Many persons of note including congressmen and senators are taking part in the services. These meetings are broadcast each Sunday at 3 p.m. over KUGN.
