UNESCO ISSUES GUIDE TO MUSIC OF INDIA

Paris—A guide and catalogue devoted to classical and traditional Indian music has been published by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (Unesco) here as part of its collection of Archives of Recorded music.

Prepared by a French specialist, M. Alain Daniel, who is known in India under the name of Shiva Sharan, the work includes an introduction to Indian musical theory and the country's instruments. The two editions, published in English and French, are illustrated.

Foster, Johnson Trial Dates Set

Judge John Wells of Justice Court announced Wednesday that trial dates had been set for Robert D. Foster and George Johnson Jr., one involved in an accident where a child was injured and the latter in a dog shooting incident.

The Foster case will be heard Thursday, February 14, and the Johnson case Wednesday, February 13. Both are set for 2 p.m.

Foster, of 70 N. 19th St., is charged with driving while under the influence of alcohol. This charge was a result of an accident when his car swerved across a road east of town striking one end of a teeter-totter near which two small boys were playing. This led to the injury of 10-year-old Henry R. Perkins.

George Johnson Jr. of Blackbutte route, is charged with shooting and killing two valuable dogs. The dogs, valued at several hundred dollars by their owner, George Hinkle, also of Blackbutte route, were found dead last September 29 by a neighbor while hunting. Hinkle signed a complaint against Johnson a few days later.

Hospital Patient Charged by Court For Drunk Driving

Curtis Charles Blackwell, a patient at Cottage Grove hospital, was charged in Justice Court this week for driving under the influence of alcohol.

Local police said that Blackwell would be picked up by officers as soon as he was released from the hospital, probably right away.

The charge was made in Justice Court after Blackwell was involved in an accident on January 23 with Eldon Erickson, Cottage Grove policeman. Erickson said that Blackwell hit him in a head-on collision about one and a half miles North of Creswell. Blackwell was hospitalized with broken ribs, a punctured lung and broken shoulder bones. Erickson received minor injuries, including injury to a leg that had been hurt in a previous car accident. Erickson's car, a '49 Mercury, was demolished.

Erickson said Blackwell will be held by police until he appears to plead and will be asked to post bail of \$500.
