Reflections.



ABE LINCOLN

Stephan Douglas said, "He (Lincoln) is an adversary worthy of my greatest effort." Lincoln won many of our most notable law suits by deep study, careful planning and expert timing. One of the great errors of our time is the remark, "Lincoln composed his Gettysburg speech on scraps of paper and old envelopes as he rode to Gettysburg."

He spent hours, and days, composing his thoughts, writing and rewriting that jewel of our literature: "Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth upon this continent a new Nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal—" Was that inspiration, a flash of genius or result of careful arrangement? It was the result of deep thought, a conviction deep within the recesses of his soul and expressed in words everyone can understand.

He was appealing to a jury of his Countrymen. We have brought in a verdict and that verdict will stand as long as free men can read and express themselves.

We were glad to have honored him February 12th.

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
