Two McCoy Motor Mechanics Honored For Completing Auto Service Course

Two employees of McCoy Motors have been honored by the Chrysler Corporation for the successful completion of 12 sessions of a continuous course in factory-approved methods of servicing cars and trucks.

Receiving certificates were Art Kofoid, shop foreman, and R. L. (Bob) McCoy, shop technician. They completed a year of participation in the service program conducted in Cottage Grove and Portland as part of the company's Master Technicians' Service Conference plan.

L. J. McCoy, president of the firm, said he believed they were the only two mechanics in the vicinity that had completed their courses to date.

"It is rather gratifying to note that both men passed every one of their tests with a grade higher than 91," Mr. McCoy said.

Mr. Kofoid has lived in Cottage Grove three and a half years and had been employed by McCoy Motors the entire time. Mr. McCoy said he had come highly recommended from a Chrysler dealer in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. He has had 25 years experience in auto service departments.

Bob was born and raised in Cottage Grove and spent much time in the garage. He served in the Navy during World War II and attended motor school at Great Lakes. He also served with Admiral Byrd on a trip to the South Pole and after returning was sent to Point Barrow, northernmost point in Alaska. He has been with the firm since his discharge.

Built Around Kits

Planning of the program, which involves over 64,000 mechanics throughout the country, includes counseling with selected dealer service managers and mechanics. The training course is built around a series of instructional kits, one of which McCoy Motors receives every month. Each kit is devoted to a "tell, show, and do" presentation of a basic service problem, selected from surveys of dealer requests for information. For the "tell" part of the session, the first item in the kit is a 20-minute

sound slide film outlining basic principles of an automobile service operation, how to recognize the problem and how to make the necessary corrections.

In the "show" part of the session, large blow-up charts and full information as to procedure for Gib Groves, the factory conference leader in Region 23 is supplied, together with a list of parts and tools required for a demonstration. The mechanic is then allowed to perform the service operation himself, representing the "do" part of the session. Finally, a reference book summarizing the entire subject is supplied for the mechanic's personal use.

Answers Questions

At the end of each service session, the mechanic checks his progress by means of a series of questions. Questionnaires, when filled out, are returned to the factory for review and grading and become a permanent record at the factory, acting as a basis for future awards to the dealer and mechanic.

No Ill Effects Of Nickel Lodged In Throat for Week

A nickel lodged in the esophagus of a 2½-year-old child for a week evidently had no bad effect, but could have been fatal had she suddenly screamed or coughed. It was a week from the time the child swallowed the nickel until it was removed.

The small girl, Sandra Lee, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Fraser. The family was visiting relatives at Port Orford at the time, January 22, but the child seemed to have no ill effects until seven days later when she refused to eat. She was taken to a doctor in Coquille who located the nickel in her esophagus, but was unable to remove it.

Nickel Removed

The Coquille doctor advised them to take Sandra Lee to Doernbecher Hospital in Portland where instruments were available for removing articles from the esophagus. The next day, just one week after she swallowed the nickel, it was removed at Doernbecher Hospital with instruments. No surgery was necessary and Sandra Lee is reported as good as new.
