Accidents Increase At Intersections

An upsurge of accidents in accidents in which a car stops at a stop sign and then pulls out into the intersection in front of an oncoming vehicle has been noted in recent weeks the Secretary of State's office in Salem has reported.

The department's traffic safety division blames it all on drivers who misjudge the distance a car

can roll at even relatively low speeds.

Said the division: "Many drivers fail to realize that cars traveling 30 miles an hour will cover 44 feet in one second. When a driver stopped at a stop sign spots a car doing 30 about 150 feet away, that car can cover 176 feet by the time the stopped car gets into the intersection. The result of misjudgment in such case is obvious."

BONANZA QUICKSILVER MINE REOPENED IN DOUGLAS COUNTY

In response to the large increase in the price of quicksilver early in 1951 the Bonanza quicksilver mine in Douglas County reopened recently. The property has been in steady production ever since, and additional ore reserves have been developed as a result of exploration work conducted on the 500- and 600-foot levels in the mine. The Bonanza was the only large

producer in the state during the year, with an estimated production valued at roughly \$250,000. One prospect in central Oregon retorted and sold a few flasks. Quicksilver prices fluctuated slightly after reaching the \$220 per flask level about the middle of the year, reaching a high of \$227 at one time. Price quoted for the week ending January 5, 1952, was \$208 to \$211 per flask depending upon the quantity. (The Ore Bin)
