Oregon, OSC Ready For Second Series

Oregon State College, Corvallis—Oregon State's youthful Beavers, hexed in their attempt to find a winning recipe against Oregon last week end, will have some time in which to sharpen their shooting eyes for the final Web-foot series of the year. The traditional rivalry play at Eugene on Friday, February 29 and wind up the season in Gill Coliseum on March 1.

Coach Slat Gill had every reason to be unhappy as he looked back on the week end games with Oregon. The Beavers' shooting was the worst of the year and at the free throw line they also fell into a basket drouth, missing 27 in one game alone. On the other hand, Oregon fired away at a .488 clip in the Saturday contest and Eugene was practically unbeatable.

OSC In Cellar
The pair of losses to the Ducks left Oregon State with a record of 8-18 for the season and 2-12 in northern division competition. This will mark the first time in history an Oregon State basketball team has had sole occupancy of the cellar. The Beavers were close to it last season, but finally wound up with a tie with Idaho for the position.

Forward Danny Johnston, whom Orange followers call the best "little man" in the northern division, widened his team scoring lead over the week end, picking up 26 tallies in the two games. It brought his ND total to 175, which is just 12 short of Lew Beck's 1947 mark. Johnston has 302 points for the entire season.

Season Fish Laws Are Now in Effect

Angling regulations adopted by the game commission recently are now in effect. The new winter regulations apply at present and will remain in force until March 16 in Zone 1, April 18 in Zone 2, and May 2 in eastern Oregon.

In Zones 1 and 2 which include all of western Oregon except the Umpqua and Rogue systems, the winter bag limit is two fish per day and four per week, 12 inches or over, embracing any combination of trout, jack salmon, steelhead or salmon.

East Bag Limit
In eastern Oregon the winter bag limit is two steelhead or salmon 20 inches and over per day or four such fish per week.

On the Umpqua and Rogue systems the winter regulations now applying are identical to those of last year.

Of interest is the fact that the practice of listing waters open to winter angling as has been done for several years in Zone 1 (coast) has been adopted for Zone 2 and all of the eastern part of the state. Streams or lakes whose names do not appear on the listings are closed entirely to winter angling. Until the 1952 synopsis is available in March, the February bulletin of the game commission should be used for reference. Winter angling waters are listed by zone in that bulletin on pages 11 and 12.

Anglers must continue to use the 1951 steelhead-salmon tag card until it is replaced by the 1952 punch card which will become effective on March 16.

Scouts Plan Swim At U of O April 5

The Third Annual Explorer Swim of the Oregon Trail Area Council Boy Scouts of America will be held Saturday April 5th at the University of Oregon Men's Pool in Eugene. All Explorers are eligible to compete including Explorers from Posts, Ships, Squadron and Explorers from within the Scout Troops.

The following classifications will be used and each contestant must enter the class applicable to himself unless he desires to enter a class above his own. 4'10" and under, 5'2" and under, 5'6" and under and the unlimited classification are the four classes which an Explorer may enter.

The meet will begin at 1:30 but all contestants are requested to be at the pool by 1:00 p.m. Trunks and cap must be worn and between races the contestants must wear bathrobes, blankets or sweaters.

All Explorer Advisors are urged to register their teams early. No entries will be accepted later than April 2. Registration may be done by mail or by coming into the Scout Office. Phone registrations will not be accepted. There will be no fee required for registration.

Rod and Gun Club Invited on Tour

At the regular meeting of the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun Club February 18 at the club house, members were invited to attend the "Show Me Tour" of mule deer winter ranges which will be held in the John Day Valley, February 21-22-23, weather permitting. This tour is sponsored by the State Game Commission.

President A. D. Baker presided over the business meeting at which time plans were made to have a picnic on March 1. This will be at the clubhouse at 8 p.m., the proceeds to be used on rifle range. Entertainment will be in the form of a card party or motion pictures.

The annual Oregon Journal Telegraphic shoot and program shoot will start March 2.

Ray Vincent reported that the caretaker's building was complete on the outside, but the inside will have to dry out somewhat before it can be completed.

The club voted to send \$25 to Save the Deschutes committee in support of the Wildlife Federation, and a legislative committee was appointed and instructed to write our senators to support Bill 565.

Game, Fish License Sales Reach Peak

One out of every four Oregonians hunted or fished in 1951 with sales of hunting and fishing licenses reaching a new peak of 411,501, reports the game commission.

"Monies spent by the average citizen to go hunting and fishing represent a vast source of revenue dispersed throughout Oregon," commented State Game Director P. W. Schneider, "and until this fact is realized the significance of one-fourth the state population using our wildlife resources cannot be fully appreciated."
