Sawlog Demand Up In Valley Areas

Demand for Douglas fir sawlogs at ceiling prices was very good in the Willamette Valley during the week ending February 16. Some shortage of logs was reported in Lane County, probably due to a combination of weather condition and price ceilings. Other forest products were mostly unchanged, according to the weekly farm forest products market report prepared from data supplied by the State Board of Forestry to the OSC Extension Service.

Douglas Fir Sawlogs were in very good demand at ceiling prices in the Willamette valley last week. Some mills in Lane county were operating below capacity because of a shortage of logs. Second-growth sawlogs in the northern and central valley were \$40 a thousand board feet for No. 3's and \$50 for No. 2's at river points. Ceiling prices at mills were reduced by the costs of booming and rafting and any differences in hauling costs. These costs ranged from \$2 to \$3.10 a thousand. Lane

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES ARE ELIGIBLE FOR PILOT OR OBSERVER TRAINING

Washington, D. C., February 18.—High school graduates who enlist for four years in the Air Force will be eligible immediately to apply for pilot or observer training, the Air Force said today. Formerly, high school graduates were required to serve 18 months before they could apply.

Applicants will be chosen for flying training on a competitive basis. Accepted civilian applicants with two or more years of college may continue to enlist in the Air Force for a two-year period.

Those successfully completing flying training will continue to be commissioned in the Air Force Reserve and to serve for three years on active duty, as in the past.
