**Christian Citizenship Mass Meeting Set For 28th, Corvallis**

A Christian Citizenship mass meeting will be held at the First Baptist church of Corvallis February 28 under the sponsorship of the evangelical churches of the area, according to announcement made this week by the Rev. Byron Jacobson, temporary chairman of the new organization.

Two outstanding religious leaders are scheduled for the occasion. Dr. Carl F. H. Henry of Fuller Theological Seminary of Pasadena, California will speak on the subject, "The Urgency of Cooperative Evangelical Action." Dr. Henry, well known for his many books, is regarded as one of the greatest evangelical scholars of the day.

"God and the Nations" will be the subject of an illustrated lecture to be presented by Bishop Leslie R. Marston, past president of the National Association of Evangelicals. The address will present the needs of the nations of Europe based upon personal observations by Bishop Marston during his travels last summer.

Music for the evening will be furnished by the choir of George Fox College of Newberg.

**World Day of Prayer Set for February 29**

The World Day of Prayer will be held this year at the First Presbyterian Church, Third and Adams, February 29, from 2:00 to 4:00. The program for 1952 comes from the migrants, sharecroppers and Indians in the U. S. A. and those who live close to the earth in other lands. The theme is: "Christ, Our Hope." The poster, "A Modern Angelus," was designed by Dorris Diabz Montour, the Iroquois Indian secretary to the Director of Christian World Missions and World Day of Prayer.

**Observance Began in 1887**

The observance began in 1887 when Mrs. Darwin R. James, President of the Woman's Board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., called on all Presbyterian women in their own communities on a specific date to pray for home missions. The response was so great that a day was set apart annually. In the early nineties, under the leadership of two outstanding Baptist women, Mrs. Henry W. Peabody and Mrs. Helen Barrett Montgomery, a day was designated for united prayer for foreign missions.

**Churches Join in 1919**

For many years home and foreign mission groups observed days of prayer separately, but in 1919 they came together. In 1920 the women of Canada joined when the first Friday in Lent was chosen as the day of prayer for missions, and of prayer for missions, (and promoted by the Council of Women for Home Missions and the Foreign Missions Conference of North America jointly). Missionaries spread the idea of a day of prayer and at the request of many friends in other lands, it became a World Day of Prayer in 1927.

(Since 1942 the planning, printing and promotion of the program in the U. S. has been the task of the World Day of Prayer Committee of the United Council of Church Women, now the General Department of United Church Women of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A.) The service will be sent out to 104 countries by the Division of Foreign Missions. The service was held in 17,000 communities in the U. S. A. in 1951.

**Unite Christians in Prayer**

The purpose of the observance is to unite Christians around the world in prayer, and in the United States to make an offering to support interdenominational missions at home and abroad. All men and women are invited to this service of prayer. There will be a nursery for small children. There will also be a tea following the service.

Members of the Protestant churches of Cottage Grove will join in this union World Day of Prayer.

**Negro Pastor Talks To Methodists On Race Relations**

Rev. James A. Covington, pastor of St. Mark's Negro Methodist church in Eugene, was guest speaker at the Cottage Grove Methodist church Sunday in celebration of Brotherhood Week.

He spoke at vespers and to the Baxter Fellowship young adult group. Three high-school age girls who accompanied him met with the Youth Fellowship group. They also entertained the Baxter group with songs.

Rev. Covington, who came to Oregon about 17 months ago from Memphis, Tennessee, is studying at Northwest Christian college for the ministry and at the same time preaching at the St. Mark's church, located in the controversial West 11th avenue district in Eugene.

**Studying Problem**

He said that a committee was now working on the problem on West 11th avenue and he had high hopes of a workable solution. The problem concerns about 56 Negroes living in the area without sewage, drainage or water. They moved there when the Ferry street bridge took their homes.

There have been many articles and pictures in the Eugene and Portland papers regarding the situation. This was followed by a mass meeting recently at the Presbyterian church in Eugene in an effort to solve the situation.

Rev. Covington stated that the city has said that water and sewer facilities were in the plan set up by the planning commission but it might be years before anything was done.

The young, nice looking Negro told the Baxter group about the parable of the good Samaritan that Jesus told the young lawyer in answer to the question, "Who is my neighbor?"

"The Lord tells us to love thy neighbor as thyself," Rev. Covington said. "The trouble with the world today is that people do not love enough."

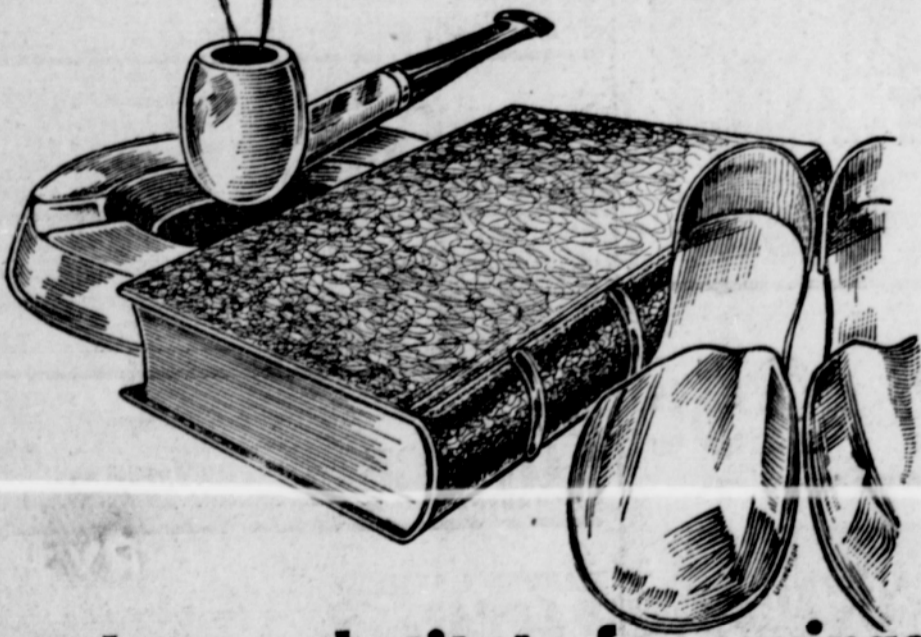
