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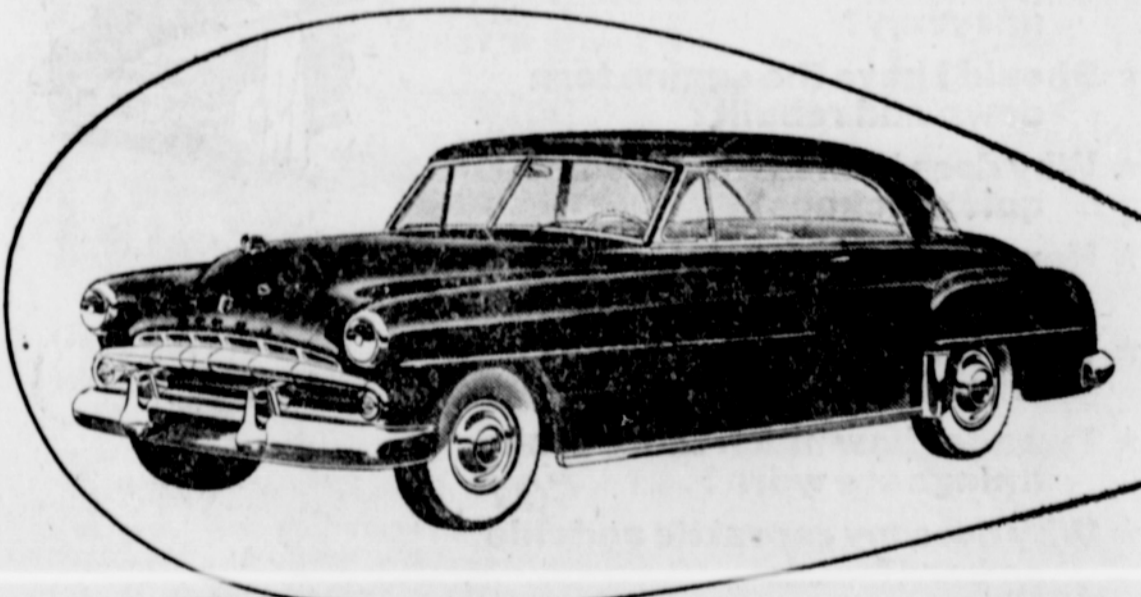
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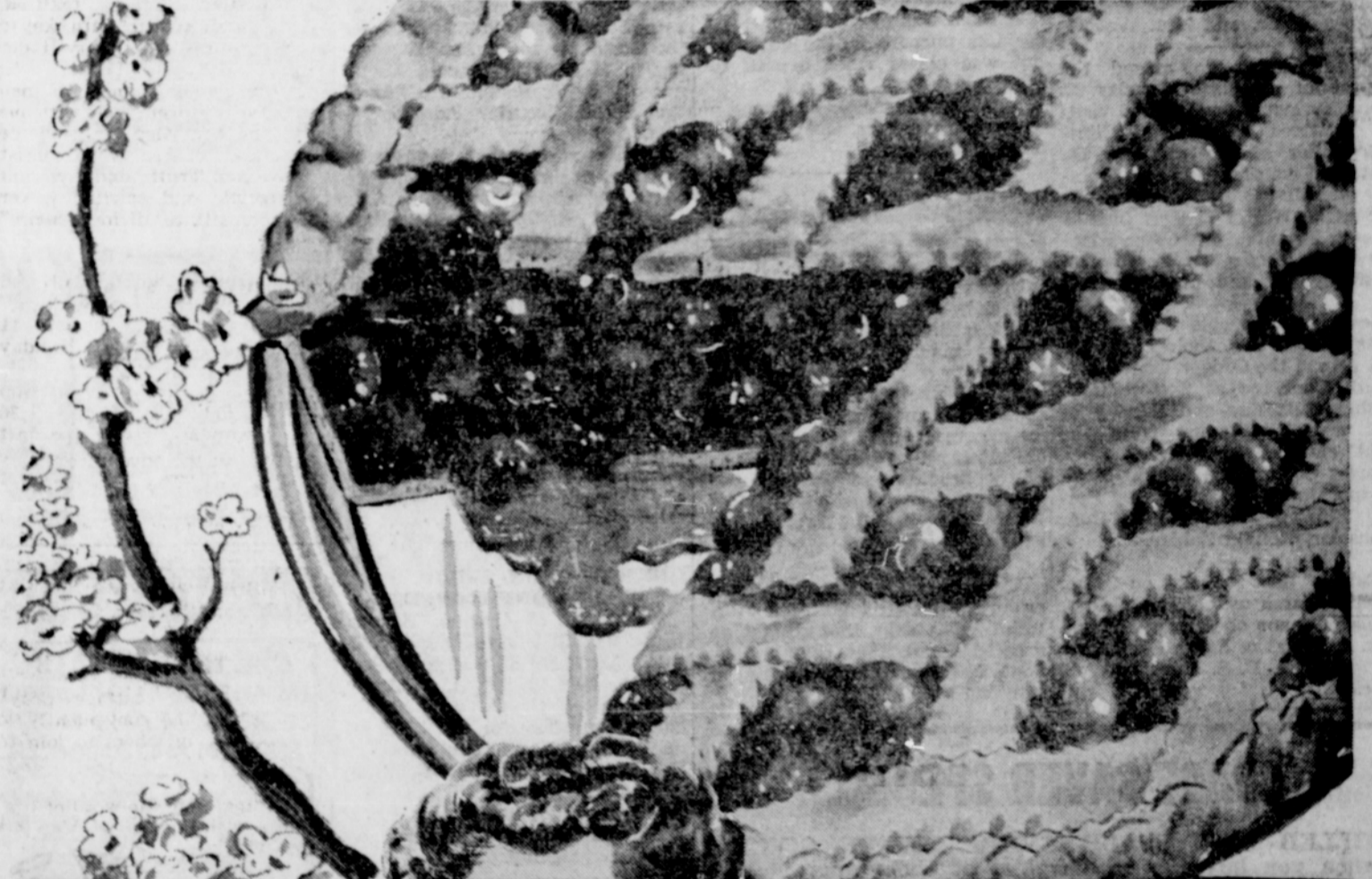

LATTICE-TOP CHERRY PIE

PIE CRUST:
Mix together:
2 1/4 cups sifted Crown Flour
1/4 teaspoon salt

Cut in:
1/2 cup cold shortening

Add a few drops at a time, mixing lightly with fork, 4 or 5 tablespoons ice water.

Toss with fork until particles are slightly moistened. Press into a ball. Divide in half. Roll on lightly floured board to 1/8-inch thickness. Place in 9-inch tin. Add cherry mixture. Put top crust on pie. Place in very hot oven (450°F.) for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350°F.) and bake about 30 minutes.

CHERRY MIXTURE:
2 1/2 cups drained canned fruit
1/2 cup fruit juice
3 tablespoons Crown Flour

Sugar if desired,
1/4 teaspoon salt
