"Safety in the Home" is Illustrated At Grange; Square Dance is Planned

(Mrs. E. G. Sherrill) A very interesting and educational program was presented recently at Dorena Grange by the H.E.C. Chairman, Helen Tryk, which stressed safety in the home and at the Grange. Following a reading, "Safety in the Home," by Helen Tryk, Ellen Sherrill and Raymond Wicks sang a duet, "Homes that are Safe," to the tune of "Home on the Range." Three short skits, illustrated the common hazards in the home, with Shirley Sherrill in a bath-tub, turning on the radio and receiving a shock; Shirley Arne and Bryon Houck, in a darkened room, using a match to examine the fuse box and gas tank—result—explosion; and Walter Larsen smoking in bed, with Ellen Sherrill too late to revive him when he is overcome by smoke when the bed catches on fire. After each skit a discussion was held on proper procedures and cures.

Safety At Grange Hall
Suggestions for safety measures around the grange hall were offered by members and read by Claude Arne. A duet by Lois Giles and Thelma Wicks on "Let's Boost for Safety," and Harold Tryk spoke on first aid methods used most frequently. All members enjoyed an action song which was led by Thelma Wicks and Ellen Sherrill.

Dorena Grange was presented with a record player and amplifier by Lee Nichols.

Ag. Chr. Raymond Wicks advised a wait of at least 30 days between lime-sulphur and oil sprays on all trees and shrubs. Too close spraying of these two types of spray will cause a burning and much damage.
