First Step in Wood Waste Utilization at Culp Creek Plant

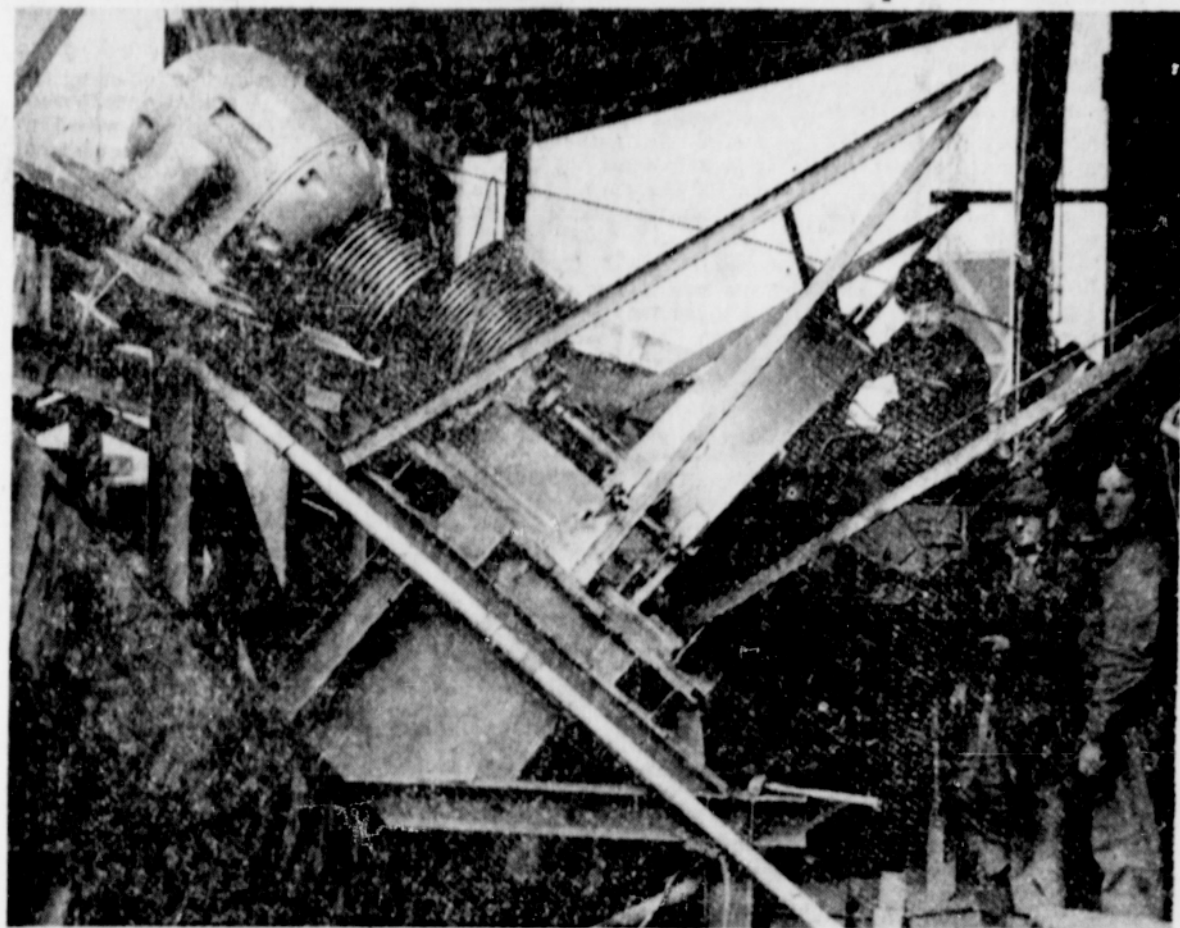

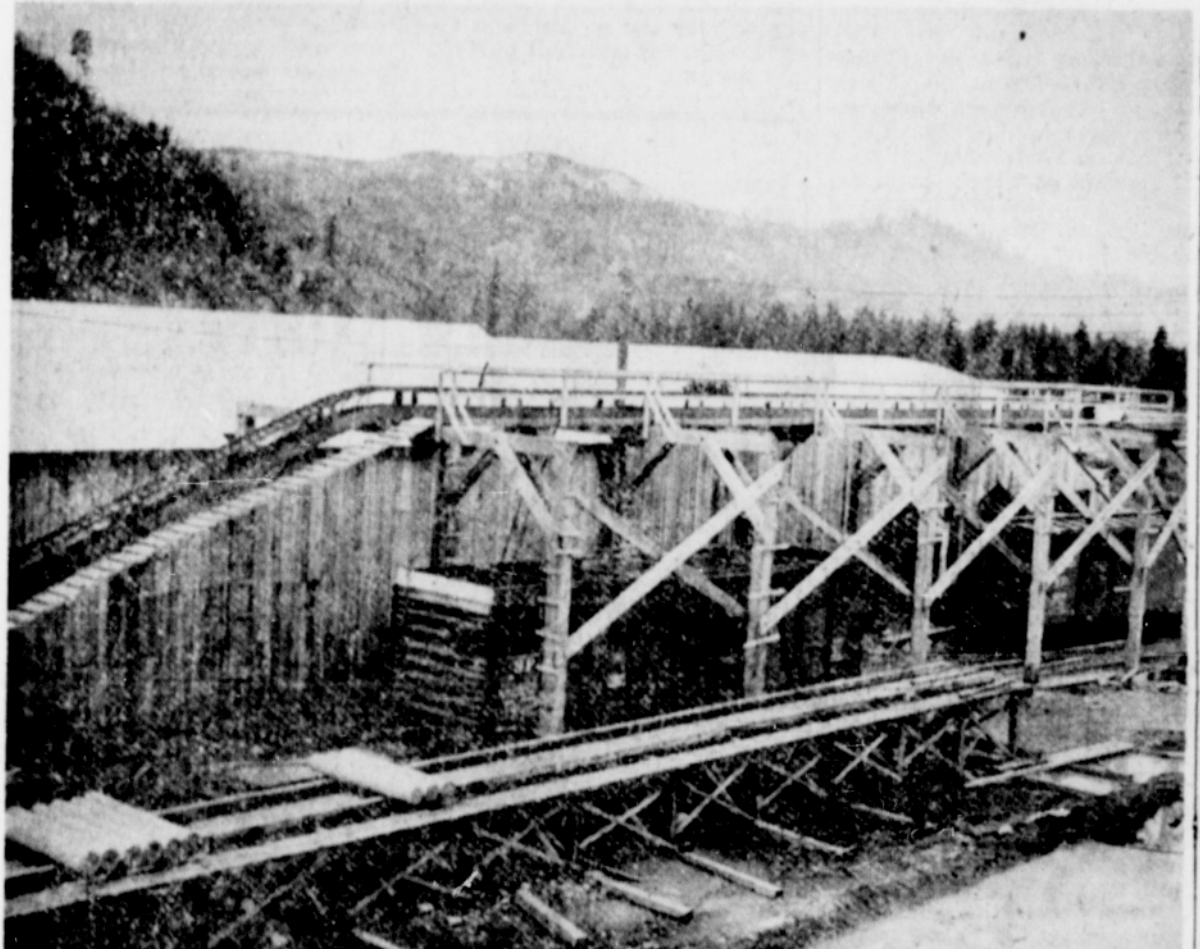

Top—Photo of the veneer chipper recently installed by the Cottage Grove Plywood plant at Culp Creek. Bottom photo shows how the chips are loaded into freight cars. The giant chipper chops rejected veneer into chips about 1/4 of an inch or smaller. The chips are carried on a conveyor to a waiting box car and dropped thru the top of the car until loaded. The conveyor system is so arranged that four box cars can be loaded simultaneously. The chips are sent to Springfield where they are ground into pulp wood and from pulpwood the chips are made into kraft wrapping paper.

The reject veneer would otherwise go into the burn pile. Incidentally, hemlock logs logged by the Bohemia Lumber Co. are sent to the Publishers' Paper Co. plant at Oregon City for making newsprint and parts of these logs are returned in the Sentinel newsprint you are reading.
