The crisp look in cottons and the sheer spring look of nylon are season headlines in your stores. Colors are light and gay, splash prints keynote the change in the weather, the full look is here to stay, and fabrics themselves are better and more wrinkle resistant, with the glazed look new in '52.

Mynette dresses for the woman who wears a half size can be found at PERRY'S. Splash prints with grey background, blue, lavender or green flowers, modified shirtwaist style with cross stitching detail on the blouse. Or a rayon sheen with tiny horizontal green or tan stripes, squared neckline. Glazed linen rayon, sleeveless, in aqua and tan, with small stripe detail on shoulder and pocket.

Lady Alice rayon linens with cardigan neckline, rhinestone button trim on blouse, in plain colors of light and dark print.

Lovely under nylon and cotton as well are the cotton slips by Roseda. Blouse is eyelet with camisole look, wide eyelet band on bottom of slip. Try a Lilyette eyelet bra to match.

For the well groomed look wear Perma-Lift "Teenies," the tiny girdle that stretches to your size on your figure. Tissue weight, nice for those who don't need much control. For those who do, the Sonnet nylon girdle is the thing—crisscross elastic panels in front for the flat look. Or Warner's famous Sta-Up-Top girdle.

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Sure'n It's Lamb Stew



St. Patrick's Day dinner—and what would please all lads and lassies more than a good Irish stew made up of tender lamb cubes and a host of vegetables mingled for fine flavor? Tomato aspic, fashioned into shamrock salads, accompanies this lamb stew.

Lamb Stew Sure to Rate Praise Of Every Erin Son on March 17

Whether you be a wearin' the green or not, a good lamb stew is the order of the day March 17. For more of a St. Pat's atmosphere accompany the stew with little tomato aspic salads in shamrock shape. Complete your menu with scones or hot rolls and, maybe, a dessert of mint ice cream balls wrapped in coconut and served with a chocolate sauce.

According to Reba Staggs, meat expert, in preparing a stew (that warrants the praise of every Irishman) make sure that you allow plenty of time for the meat to cook. Let it simmer, but never boil. When meat boils the flavor is cooked right out of it and it becomes dry and stringy.

For lamb stew use either cubes or lamb riblets cut from a lamb breast. Brown the meat or not, as desired, season with salt and pep-

per, then cover and cook slowly for 1½ to 2 hours.

Long enough before the meat is tender, add vegetables to the cooking utensil. These might be lima beans, carrots, onions and potatoes. When cooked, remove the meat and vegetables and thicken the liquid for gravy. Serve either in a large table casserole or in individual casseroles.
