National BPW Head Talks to Local Club On Equal Rights Amendment for Women

The Equal Rights Amendment that would eliminate discrimination against women in business and elsewhere is now suffering the fate of the suffrage amendment, according to Cecilia Galey of Sweet Home, national BPW legislation chairman.

Mrs. Galey spoke on legislation facing women at the regular dinner meeting held Monday night at the Methodist church. Mrs. Galey, a Sweet Home attorney, is also state BPW president.

She listed the Equal Rights Amendment as one of the strong points of the club platform. It has been introduced a number of times since its first appearance in Congress in 1932, but it has gotten

lost in committee each time. "We are too dignified today to go to the extremes that the suffragettes did who threw themselves in front of carriages and harangued meetings," she said. "But we have gained much since then."

Senate Group OK's
Mrs. Galey, who has recently been in Washington conferring with senators and congressmen on the amendment, said that in this session the Senate Judiciary committee was ready to present it to the floor but that the house committee had not taken any action on it.

She admitted that the house committee chairman was "unalterably opposed" to it. She said that he had told her as long as he was chairman it would not come out of committee.

Mrs. Galey explained that the amendment would add the word "sex" to the amendment that says "no rights shall be abridged on account of race, religion or previous servitude."

Jury Duty
"This will make rights of all people equal," she said. Some states, do not allow women to serve on juries, she said. In some states a husband can collect his wife's paycheck. In others women have to go into court and get permission to go into business provided her husband has given his consent, too.

The amendment would eliminate these discriminations, she said.

In answer to a question concerning divorce laws, Mrs. Galey admitted that in cases of custody of children that the custom had been to grant the child to the mother. However, she said that the law stated in most states that the child be awarded as would best serve the child's welfare.

Protective Laws
She also admitted women would lose some protective legislation such as limitation of hours she can

work and working at night. However, Mrs. Galey said she believed that this protective legislation was passed so that women could not earn more money and so better jobs could be given men.

Mrs. Galey urged women to take an interest in local and state legislation and called for "an informed vote."

"People in Oregon have a unique privilege in that the legislature refers legislation to them to vote upon. This is a grave responsibility and should be studied carefully."

She also said that the finest piece of legislation could be passed, but if no enforcement agency or appropriation were provided, it might as well not be on the books.

Oregon Advanced
Mrs. Galey listed Oregon also as well advanced on equality of rights for women.

Besides the Equal Rights Amendment, Mrs. Galey said that BPW nationally was working for equal pay. Other platform measures include support of the United Nations, NATO, UMT and registration and draft of women. Opposition is made to compulsory government controlled health insurance and medical care.

The club also favors civil service appointment based on competitive examinations except for the five and ten preference points allowed veterans, and retention of employees based on efficiency and length of service.

The Brownie troop the club sponsors provided entertainment in the form of tap numbers with a solo by Glenda Keffer. They were accompanied by Mrs. Norman Lewis at the piano. The group is led by Mrs. Bob Nelson.

Chairmen for the dinner included Edna Piller, local legislation committee head; Julia Jederman and Eleanor Fleming.

Special guests were six club members from Yoncalla.

At the end of the program Dr. David Morris showed the club a film on self-examination for breast cancer.

father had been out of work for three months.

The case worker explained to Mrs. Wilson the VA benefits due her as a result of her husband's death, since he had served in World War I. She was entitled to \$150 burial allowance, the headstone, and in due time following application she would be eligible for widow's benefits for herself and the minor children.

Provided Food
The Red Cross assisted the family with emergency needs for food, and the Cottage Grove Red Cross purchased shoes for the family.

On February 8 Mrs. Scheidt returned to the Wilson home. The widow said she was concerned because the rent would be due in a few days, and although her sons had sufficient funds to come from money to return. A grant was left with the family.

On the 11th Mrs. Wilson went to the Red Cross office in Eugene to complete her application for widow's pension. ARC assumed the expense of acquiring the certified documents necessary. She also applied for Social Security benefits. Victor has since arranged for a \$40 a month allotment. Mrs. Wilson told The Sentinel.

The search for leaders has always been a big problem, also development of the South Lane Fair held in Cottage Grove each fall. The leaders literally have revitalized their efforts recently by forming the South Lane 4-H Leaders association. They have regular meetings at Latham school with good programs in leadership training and phases of club work.

4-H Story

The power of "The 4-H Story" is briefly told below in a synopsis of the book, available from the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, 59 East Van Buren street, Chicago 5, Illinois.

"The 4-H Story" which the author says "is too great a movement to be claimed by any one man," unfolds through the early 1900's when the country was ready, youth was ready, the time was right for a great upsurge of rural power. Simultaneously in various parts of the country, corn clubs and canning clubs appeared, as county superintendents of schools sought to make education a more vital factor in the everyday living of the boys and girls.

Then the colleges found a way to let their new discoveries be known through youth—eager, inspired, energetic youth, who planted the experimental corn,

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who used the new ideas, who came together in groups for discussions of better methods and for comparing results. In 1911 the four-leaf clover with its signifying head, heart, hands, and health appeared, and by 1918 the term "4-H Clubs" was being generally used.

With the passage of the Smith-Lever Act in 1914, the Cooperative Extension Service was established, and a national program was on the way. In 1919 a group of public-spirited citizens foresaw a role for industry in building a stronger 4-H, in strengthening our youth, in participating in the development of rural areas to which industry owed so much. From these beginnings came the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, National Awards programs, National 4-H Club Congress, and other services to 4-H Club Work. In 1927, National 4-H Camp came into being to honor 4-H boys and

girls with outstanding abilities in leadership and citizenship. At this first National 4-H Camp, the 4-H pledge and motto were officially adopted.

Hope Lies in Youth
All this and much more are in "The 4-H Story" with countless episodes of early vision, youth's responsiveness, the strength and devotion of local volunteer 4-H leaders, the capable direction of federal, state, and county extension workers. The hope of our country lies in our youth, and today 2,000,000 boys and girls, active members of 4-H Clubs, are living by the 4-H's of head, heart, hands, and health to build richness into their lives, into their farms and homes, and into this wonderful country of ours.

M & W MARKET'S
MADE OF THE WEEK

Juicy Meat Loaf
1 lb. ground lean beef
3/4 cup Fat Milk
1/2 cup rolled oats
2 1/2 tablespoons finely cut onion
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
2 slices bacon, cut in half
4 medium onions, cut in half crosswise
Mix well beef, milk, oats, onion, salt and pepper. Dip hands in water and shape mixture into a loaf. Put into greased pan. Place onions around loaf and bacon slices on top. Bake in moderately slow oven (350°) 30 minutes, then turn onions and bake 30 minutes longer, or until loaf is brown. Serve hot or cold. Makes 4 servings.
You Will Need:
Pot Milk, Ground Beef, Rolled Oats, Onions, Bacon.

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
