OSC Engineering Grads Sought by Eighty Companies

Oregon State College—Engineering graduates are so much in demand that representatives from technical and industrial firms throughout the nation are flocking to the Oregon State college campus to interview graduating seniors.

Student engineers are in somewhat the same position as star high school athletes prior to the de-emphasis program in sports. Industry is on the proselyting prowl for technically-trained young men.

Representatives of 48 different companies have already visited the OSC campus to interview engineering prospects and before the college year ends more than 80 firms will have sent personnel seekers to the campus, according to M. R. Heath, engineering personnel and placement officer.

The intense rivalry for engineering grads, who can practically choose their own jobs, is the result of a critical shortage of engineers which is estimated at about 25,000 this year.

Linfield Will Host Speech Tournament

Eisenhower Placed On Oregon Ballot

The name of Dwight D. Eisenhower will appear as a candidate for president on the Oregon primary ballot as a result of the filing recently of nominating petitions by the Oregon for Eisenhower Committee. Action of the Oregon Committee followed a telegraphic request from Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., campaign manager for Eisenhower, asking immediate filing of the nomination petition.

The petition filed carried only a few more than the number of signatures required to place the name of Eisenhower on the ballot. Mark Hatfield, Executive Secretary of the state Eisenhower group, explained that a later supplementary filing "will include signatures from every principal community of the state after all who wish have an opportunity to join in placing the name of Dwight D. Eisenhower before the voters of Oregon."

CD Medical Units Agency Objective

One of the major objectives in civil defense is getting a medical organization, according to Dr. Harold M. Erickson, head of the medical department for the Oregon civil defense agency.

"Medical personnel have the technical background; they know their job. But it's essential that their role in disaster-relief work be expanded in that they be prepared to render medical and surgical service on a mass basis," he said. "Following an extreme emergency, when we know the availability of professional personnel would be limited, unnecessary loss of life undoubtedly would result unless doctors and nurses were equipped to serve as members of organized relief teams."

Outlines Quotas
Dr. Robert Heilman, chief of the emergency medical division, outlined the quotas for setting up mobil first-aid teams and emergency medical-hospital teams throughout Oregon. This week on "Survival," a statewide civil defense radio broadcast, he said that even counties which have not received quotas for mobile teams have been asked to provide medical protection for possible local emergencies.

Assignments for Lane county are: 15 mobil first-aid teams, 1239 persons; and 3 1/2 emergency medical-hospital teams, 211 persons.

Both of the civil defense men emphasized that medical plans are useful every day, war or peace. They said the individual citizen does not have to be a doctor or nurse to learn the type of emergency actions that will save lives, urging that everyone take the time to learn first aid and to develop a first aid kit for their homes.

SEEDLING TREE ORDER DEADLINE SET 15TH

Deadline for seedling tree orders accepted by the state forester at Salem is March 15, reminds Charles R. Ross, Oregon State college extension farm forestry specialist. Order blanks and other information may be obtained from local county extension offices.

Evergreen seedlings recommended for western Oregon planting are Douglas fir, Port Orford cedar, noble fir, and cluster pine. Recommended evergreens for eastern Oregon which are available are Scotch pine, lodgepole pine and Chinese arborvitae. Available white fir and ponderosa pine seedlings are recommended for planting in both eastern and western sections of the state.

Broadleaf seedlings available for western Oregon farmers include cascara. Suited for planting in both eastern and western Oregon are black locust, Russian mulberry and Chinese elm. Russian olive and caragena broadleaf seedlings are available for eastern Oregon planting.
